



Rabbi Leah Novick

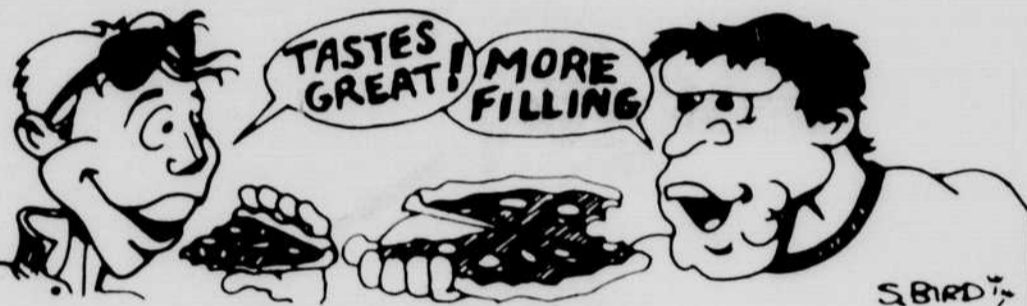

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Men take second at tournament

Season ends in Pullman with 13 wins

The Oregon men's tennis team closed out its 1990 season last weekend with the Pacific-10 Northern Division Meet in Pullman, Wash. The Ducks finished second to the powerful Washington Huskies with host Washington State finishing third.

The Ducks finished 21 match points behind the Huskies in the tournament — a comfortable Washington margin — but tennis coach Buzz Summers was pleased with his team's play over the weekend.

"They played great, I thought," Summers said. "They played up to their potential in almost every instance. I was very satisfied."

"I was confident they'd play well, but they played a bit beyond my expectations," he continued. "As a team, they did a superior job."

Summers had high praise for his top singles man, senior Kevin Cory. After a victory over WSU's Art Lambert in the first round of singles play Friday and a straight-sets win over the

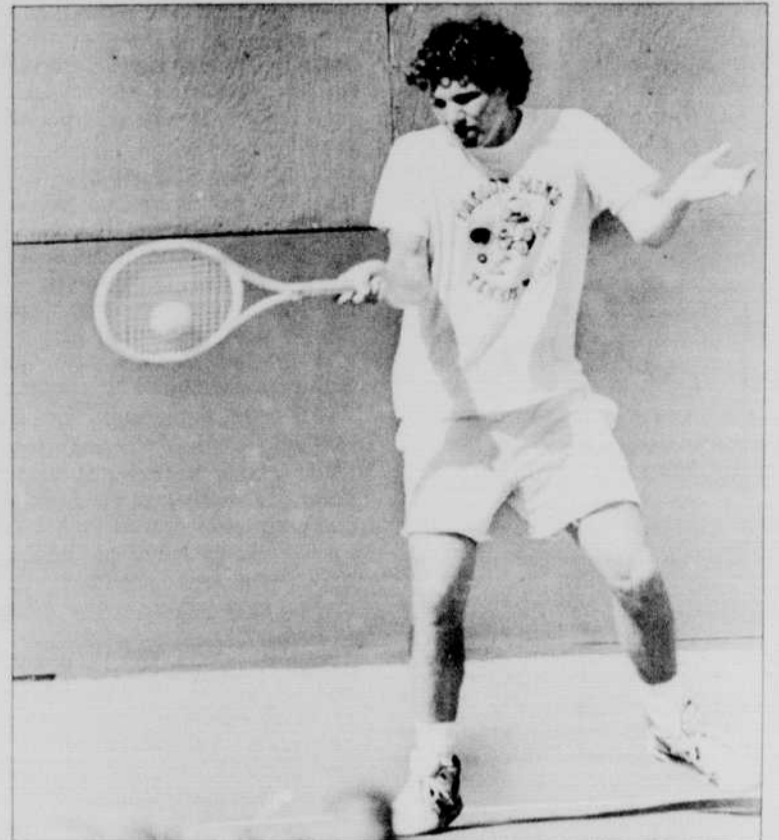

Cougars' Jerry Gibbons Saturday. Cory took on top-ranked singles man Aaron Gross in the third round.

Cory took a tough 7-6 first-set win to open the match. Gross came back to tie it 1-1 with a win in the second set. In the third and deciding set, Cory led 5-4 over the heavily favored Gross before falling 7-5.

"Kevin played some of his best tennis of the year," Summers said. "He will have a good chance to make the All-Northern Division team."

Sophomore Ted Thoren and freshman Christian Oelke also helped the Ducks tremendously, each finishing 3-1 in singles play and 2-0 on their respective doubles teams for the weekend.

Oelke's finish moved him into fifth place on Oregon's all-time list for singles wins in a

season. He finished 18-8 on the season, one win short of the all-time record held by former Oregon players Tom Greider and Mark Evans.

Kevin Settlemire and Rob Atkin teamed to take a pair of doubles wins to run their record as a team to 18-8 on the season to tie the Oregon record for wins in a season.

Ted Rubin, Oregon's no. 2 singles man, also picked up a pair of wins last weekend, 6-2, 6-2 over Jerry Gibbons of WSU and 6-2, 6-3 over Art Lambert, also of WSU.

Jon Weinberg led off the first round of singles, beating WSU's Bill Smith 6-1, 6-1. He then lost to Kenji Akagi in the second round before teaming with Rubin in round 2 doubles. The team lost on default when Weinberg re-injured an abdomen muscle.

At first glance, the men's final dual match record of 13-13 in 1990 doesn't seem like much to be too pleased about. But Summers said the men's .500 finish suits him just fine.

"Our goal was a .500 season and we made on that last match against Portland and the one against Lewis & Clark," Summers said. Oregon beat Portland 8-1 on April 14 then shut out Lewis and Clark 9-0 two days later.

Summers pointed out that the Ducks started the season with five straight losses and were 2-12 after their 6-0 loss March 18 against Louisville. The Ducks rebounded after that to win 11 of 12 for the .500 finish.

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
