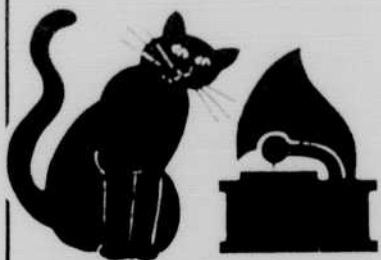


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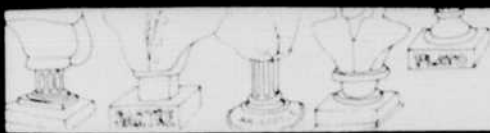

Togetherness theme of revived tradition

Building solidarity and unity through beautification and renovation is the theme of the revival of University Day 1990, said Doug Untalan, University Day committee member.

Although a large part of University Day involves renovation and beautification around the campus, Untalan said the main goal is to bring students and faculty together.

"University Day is designed primarily for student groups to get together by being unified to understand their differences more and the University more," he said.

Untalan said the responses from student groups and faculty have been positive, and he expects a big turnout for the May 17 event.

The committee has mailed information to more than 285 groups and has conducted several phone campaigns to make sure student groups who want to partake in the activities are notified, Untalan said.

"We had one informational meeting and over 30 student groups came," he said, adding that 10 groups were unable to attend.

Although the committee has been targeting large groups such as the greek system and University Housing, Untalan said it is trying to reach out to all student groups.

"We want a breadth of groups," he said.

Untalan said many student groups don't feel like they are a part of the University because there is so much fragmentation among the groups on campus.

"If we can just get people to touch each other outside of their normal circle, the event would be a success," said Brian Sandy, University Day committee member.

"The first and foremost priority is to build the communication and solidarity," Sandy said.

"The ideal scenario for University Day is that everyone close down shop and join together to celebrate," Sandy said.

University Day began in the 1890s and continued to be a tradition throughout the 1920s. It was a day for the entire University population to engage in a collaborative effort to beautify the campus and unify the community.
