

hance the program.

Palmer said the interdisciplinary major will not be offered next fall and there are no plans to continue the program in the future. Although it's possible the program will be restored later, it's not what he would expect, he said.

However, a provision has been made to see all current American Studies majors through the program, Brand said.

American Studies was competing with other programs judged to be of higher priority, Brand said, adding that the program was not included in last year's budget cutbacks.

"Neither was molecular biology," Donald replied.

"So what?" Brand asked. "I don't think the University is in a position to expand during cutbacks."

All the money being saved from dropping American Studies is going into English programs, Palmer said.

Brand and students also discussed questions about Pearl Buck Recycling's pullout of the University's recycling service, underreporting of campus rape, and student appointments to

the Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee.

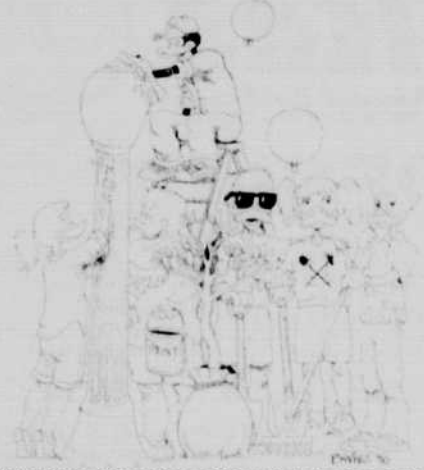
In addition, concerns were raised about problems with advising for students, CIA and ROTC recruitment practices, and a perception that business and science programs have an advantage over humanities in funding on campus.

Brand expressed interest in student proposals for the University to continue recycling in conjunction with students until a possible IFC-funded campus program can be established next year.

Responding to a question of why students affiliated with the Council for Animal Research and not Students for the Ethical Treatment of Animals were appointed to the IACUC, Brand said the committee is designed to evaluate the protocol of animal care and research at the University and not to question the legitimacy of such research.

Brand said he supported the resolution, passed by the University Senate, requesting that all recruiters, including the CIA, sign an affirmative action statement before interviewing students.
