also suffered. "Klaus is the key link in our chain and without him we're out of sync," Walcott said.

Weigeldt finished fourth in last year's Pac-10 meet and now has the sixth-fastest time of the season heading into the conference meet.

Walcott said he thought the automatic NCAA qualifying standard of 46.20 is definitely within Weigeldt's reach, while Weigeldt said being out for so long may give him an advantage next weekend.

"A lot of people might have forgotten about me and I might not be considered as real competition," he said.

Not only did Oregon get the Pac-10 qualifying mark it sought from Weigeldt, but Curtis Wilson finished second in the 400 in a personal record of 47.25, teammate Chris Thoma-

son added a PR of 47.72 to qualify for the Pac-10 meet and Brian Wright was fourth in 47.99, also a PR.

Danny Lopez took a break from the 3,000-meter steeplechase to run the 800 meters and turned in a Pac-10 qualifying 1:50.30, the fastest 800 by an Oregon runner this season.

"I'm happy," Lopez said. "(Oregon head coach) Bill (Dellinger) finally let me really go for it in the 8(00). I thought it would be around 1:48-1:49, but I'm not disappointed."

Oregon's Eric Peterson won the 1,500 meters, but wasn't able to break the NCAA standard of 3:42.20 when he finished in 3:46.16. Oregon's Pat Haller and Rick Mestler finished third and fourth, respectively, turning in PRs of 3:46.91 and 3:47.27.

The Ducks also got good performances from Grady O'Connor in the 400-meter hurdles, Jason Walton in the high jump

and Tye Van Schoiack in the steeplechase.

O'Connor won his event in 52.68 for a PR and a Pac-10 qualifying time while Walton tied his PR in the high jump at 6-10 3/4.

Van Schoiack set a PR with a time of 8:54.41 in the steeple, qualifying for the Pac-10 meet.

However, Latin Berry and Spencer Williams were unable to move off the NCAA provisional lists in the long jump and triple jump, respectively.

"I would have felt better had Spencer, Latin and Eric qualified because those are three key people we need for NCAAs," Dellinger said. "They're still not there yet and not to the point where I'd like them to be."

**Men's Notes:** Oregon's Pedro da Silva and Mike Leonasio will be in Pac-10 decathlon which starts Monday in Seattle and ends Tuesday. DaSilva is a strong favorite to win.

ditions," Heinonen said. "When the conditions are right, she will be more confident."

Freshman Erika Klein finally broke the Pac-10 standard in the 800, after narrowly missing in two previous races. Klein's time of 2:10.98 is a new PR and makes her the third Duck to qualify for the Pac-10s in the event.

"Erika was just smashing her head against the wall. She missed the standard by one-

tenth (of a second) once and by five hundredths once," Heinonen said.

Kim Hutson was the highest Oregon finisher in Saturday's 800, edging Klein with a time of 2:10.70. Hutson had already qualified for the Pac-10 meet.

The javelin was the setting for another meet record.

Karin Smith of Nike West, and a coach at South Eugene High School, had a toss of 195-7 to surpass the old mark of 191-0 set by Kathy Sulinski in 1985.

"I love this place. I wanted to come back and throw well in front of the kids from South Eugene," Smith said. "This is wonderful. I wouldn't trade this for the world."

The Pac-10 meet is next for Oregon. The heptathlon gets underway today at Husky Stadium in Seattle. Kamala Kohlmeier and Kelly Blair look to get the scoring started early for the Ducks. The event concludes Tuesday afternoon.

The remainder of the events take place Saturday and Sunday.
