Need to expand

Across the nation, collegiate

fraternity and sorority systems are expanding in numbers and popularity. For example, Kappa Delta is also in the process of adding more chapters in California, Kansas, Connecticut. New Hampshire and Wisconsin.

The University's greek system is likewise undergoing an upsurge. Every fall, about 1,000 men and women sign up for rush, the week-long process where new college students select and pledge membership to

Rush classes had increased in size four years in a row until they leveled off last fall when the University cut back on enrollment

The demand created a problem for the University's 10 existing sororities (Alpha Omicron Pi, an 11th sorority. closed down last fall). Membership at each chapter ranged from 80-120 women; each new fall class added about 45 more.

Deanna Jurgens, this year's Panhellenic president and last year's expansion chairwoman, sent out letters to national sorority organizations inviting them to consider setting up at the University.
