

Portland hosts international conference

Oregon chancellor Bartlett to speak

A group of University students and faculty along with more than 2,000 delegates and speakers from all over the world will gather in Portland this week for an international education conference.

The conference is the 42nd annual gathering of the National Association for Foreign Student Affairs.

The purpose of the confer-

ence is to address the changing environment for international educators and administrators. Participants will be discussing recent changes in the world and their impact on international education.

More than 180 workshops will expound upon the theme of "Building Environments for International Competence."

Ernest L. Boyer, president of the Carnegie Foundation for the Advancement of Teaching and a senior fellow at Princeton University's Woodrow Wilson

School, will deliver the keynote address.

Thomas Bartlett, chancellor of the Oregon State System of Higher Education will also speak.

Cheryl Hill, a senior majoring in German and Scandinavian languages, said the conference offers an opportunity for foreign student advisers to meet and discuss issues and problems related to their field.

"(The conference) is a network for people in international education all across the

country," she said. "It's a good place to make contacts and it provides a support system for advisers."

Hill, who hopes to be involved in foreign student advising after graduation, said she will attend workshops related to her field.

"I'm hoping to learn about different opportunities in overseas education," she said.

Workshops will help advisers and teachers understand the current events that have a huge impact on foreign study programs, Hill said, adding that participants will be able to learn about education systems in other countries.

Police Beat

The following is a list of campus area crimes taken from Office of Public Safety and Eugene Police Department reports between May 4 and May 14:

- OPS arrested a subject in the Knight Library on May 14, after responding to library employee complaints that the subject was causing a disturbance on the second floor. The subject insulted the arresting officer and loudly demanded to know the identities of the complainants before being taken to jail.
- EPD cited two Spiller dorm residents for unlawful possession of marijuana off campus

on May 12.

EPD plainclothes officers observed two white males approach a car in the area of 13th Avenue and Alder Street, and overheard one subject arranging to purchase drugs from the other.

The subjects walked together to the U.S. Bank parking lot at 810 E. 13th Ave. and entered a pickup truck. A few minutes later, approaching EPD officers observed the subject smoking from a pipe which turned out to be marijuana.

EPD seized about one gram of marijuana, a wooden pipe and

\$134 in cash.

• OPS cited a subject for being a minor in possession and trespassing on University property on May 12. The subject, who was not a University student, tried to flee when approached by OPS at the east side of the Education building, and briefly struggled after being caught.

• OPS cited two transients at University Inn for drinking on unlicensed premises on May 11.

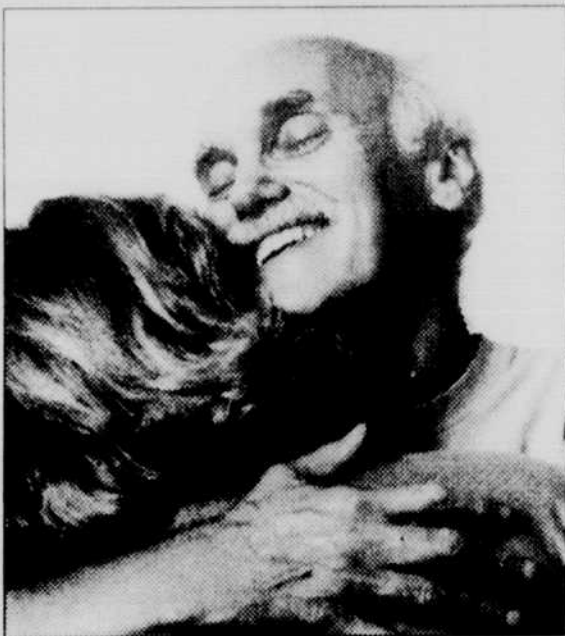
• EPD cited a Willcox dorm resident for cultivation of marijuana on May 9. OPS informed EPD after receiving an anonymous tip that marijuana was being grown in the resident's room.

Upon investigation, EPD and OPS observed 10 marijuana plants and three pipes in the room. EPD seized the property and cited the resident, who was in the room at the time.

• A \$289 VCR was reported stolen from the Knight Library to EPD on May 4. There were no signs of forced entry to the locked cabinet, in which the VCR was stored, and to which four keys were missing.

• In addition, OPS reports four bikes stolen, none recovered.
