

# New Emerald staff chosen

After a week of interviewing 58 applicants, the *Oregon Daily Emerald*'s management team announced its 1990-91 news staff Friday.

"I was extremely pleased at the number of people who applied this year," said Alice Wheeler, next year's editor. "It's a fairly experienced group of people, and that will be excellent for the paper. We've hired people with national and international experience."

Assisting Wheeler in this year's hiring were Christopher Blair, next year's managing editor, and Chris Bouneff, next year's news editor.

There will be several changes for the *Emerald* next year. Wheeler said, including the creation of a politics beat a change in the way the paper will cover in-depth features.

Joe Kidd was named associate editor of the politics beat, and will travel to Salem two to three times a week to cover events in the Oregon Legislature. Rene DeCair will also cover legislative issues as politics reporter.

Peter Cogswell was named higher education associate editor, and assisting him as reporters will be Cathy Petersen and Ben Heskett. Wheeler said the politics and higher education beats will have much in common, as both will be following the problems of funding the state's education system.

"Funding will definitely be the big issue next year." Wheeler said. "Another important issue will be what's happening with the liberal arts program and how the lack of funding is affecting its programs."

Stacy lvie will cover in-depth articles for the Emerald's features beat, assisted by reporter Tammy Batey. This year's "Monday In-Depth" section will change, stories from the features beat will still bear an in-depth tag, but will not be on such a regular schedule, allowing the features beat to cover more stories the other beats don't have time to investigate fully.

Catherine Hawley will return as student activities/government associate editor, and will be joined by reporters Daralyn Trappe and Carrie Dennett. Wheeler said the beat will be watching the activities of the new ASUO administration.

Don Peters will be in charge of coordinating coverage of events and issues in Eugene and Lane County. His reporters will be Brian Bloch and June Russell. Wheeler said Peters. Bloch and Russell will pay close attention to recent developments at the Riverfront Research Park site and relations between the community and University.

Ashley Conklin will be in charge of the sports desk, aided by sports reporters Robert Weber and Paul Morgan. Wheeler said she would like to see the sports beat expand its coverage, investigating the budgeting process of the Athletic Department and how Oregon fits into the collegiate athletics system as a whole.

Graphics editor Sean Poston will oversee the photos and overall graphic look of the paper. Wheeler said Poston and his photographers and graphic artists will be invaluable when the *Emerald* continues its layout changes next year.

Pat Malach and Rob Ward will team up to write editorials and coordinate commentaries and the *Emerald's* letters section.

Layne Lakefish, next year's entertainment editor, will be joined by reporter Ming Rodrigues in putting out the entertainment section.

"I'd like to see more information for students in the section." Wheeler said. "I'd like to see the section filled with things students want to do, places they want to go and people they want to know about."
