## OSL sets sights on next year

Athletic deficit, financial aid targeted issues

Getting the athletic department out of debt and lobbying for more financial aid for minorities are two of the Oregon Student Lobby's goals for the next school year, said new ASUO vice president Sheila

Stickel said the OSL is currently organizing its agenda for the 1990-91 year.

Concerns the OSL feel are most worthy of attention are collegiate athletic funding, financial aid, disabled access and faculty salaries.

It is going to be very important this summer to get in contact with legislators and to make sure we're pushing funding for higher education." Stickel said.

Student participation is also important to accomplish OSL goals, she said.

When you have numbers it really says something," she "Just getting involved before it's too late is very important. Once you lose something, the struggle to get it back is so much harder.

Athletic Department

According to an OSL memorandum, the total Athletic Department deficit in Oregon is approximately \$5.7 million.

Oregon State University is \$2.9 million in debt, followed by Portland State University with \$1.9 million and this University with \$.9 million. Eastern Oregon State College is less than \$20,000 in debt while Oregon Institute of Technology, Southern Oregon State College and Western Oregon State College together are less than \$10,000 in debt.

The Oregon State Board of Higher Education will meet June 14 to determine how Oregon colleges and universities will pay off their deficits

'It's up to the state board." said Steve Hellyer, University sports information director. The ball's in their court.

Dave Williford, sports information assistant director, said the board will decide on a solution for all the schools in the state system and not just for the University

He said the board is considering many options, from waiving the deficits entirely to making schools come up with solutions for themselves.

'As all the schools involved, we're hoping for assistance of some sort," Williford said.

Stickel said the OSL is advocating for each school to continue being responsible for its own debt, rather than having smaller schools help pay off the deficit for larger schools.

Stickel added that the OSL does not want to see the burden of a larger debt placed on the whole state, whether it be with solutions for themselves.

We have some control through our pocketbooks. she said. She said approximately \$30 per student per term goes to the Incidental Fee Committee. The IFC, in turn, allocates funds to the Athletic Department.

Although the IFC granted the Athletic Department's requested zero percent increase in funds to match last year's \$1.2 million budget, Stickel said, "Sometimes they have trouble challenging the Athletic Department because they're such a powerful
