# Packwood vows to fight for timber worker's jobs

EUGENE (AP) — Sen. Bob Packwood, R-Ore., wearing a yellow sweater as a symbol of sympathy for timber workers, got a standing ovation when he said "there's no better place to cut and replant trees than the state of Oregon."

Speaking before about 300 people at Festival Northwest, a timber industry festival and rally held Saturday in Eugene. Packwood vowed to continue to the fight to save jobs he said are threatened by the decline of the northern spotted owl.

"I will do everything humanly possible to make sure the trees of the state of Oregon, the U.S. Forest Service, the Bureau of Land Management and private lands are managed on a basis of trees forever." he said.

He noted 1990 is the 30th anniversary of the federal law mandating multiple use on national forests. He said that includes managing trees on those forests "on a sustained yield basis forever."

He also praised the Yellow Ribbon Coalition's efforts to put the industry's case before the public. The daylong festival at the Lane County Convention Center included a lot of yellow ribbons and balloons, industry displays, loggers' competitions such as ax-throwing and a Saturday night dance.
