

Bailey, Stickel devote summer to planning for upcoming year

For ASUO President Kirk Bailey and Vice President Sheila Stickel, summer term will be devoted to making the transition to a new student government and planning events and projects for the 1990-91 school year.

Some of the planning for what will be addressed this year will be done at the ASUO staff retreat in mid-July. At that time, Bailey, Stickel and their staff will discuss what issues and projects will be emphasized during their year in office.

Bailey said he expects student accessibility to child care and higher education funding to be some of the issues on top of the agenda.

Stickel is chairing the Oregon Student Lobby this summer, and said she hopes that experience will give her better insight into higher education funding and the state legislative process.

"I'll stay on top of what's going on there," she said. "I'm learning about that and about the state board of higher education."

Student health insurance is one of the University issues that Bailey and Stickel are already discussing. Prudential

Insurance Company canceled its contract with the University because it was losing money, and summer term is the last term it will be offering student insurance here.

Although he would not elaborate, Bailey said he expects a resolution to the problem within a week.

A new Student Health Insurance Committee will be appointed in early July. Bailey and Stickel will be accepting student applications for the positions during the next two

weeks.

Bailey said he hopes students who have concerns, suggestions or questions about the ASUO or issues that will be addressed this year will stop by the ASUO office sometime during summer term.

"Now is a good time to come in and talk to us," he said.

Bailey noted that because he and Stickel are working as co-presidents rather than president and vice-president, students can speak to either one of them about anything.

said the ASUO has joined the Oregon Student Lobby in fundamentally opposing the resolution. "The ASUO position is that we are opposed to anything that hinders the stu-

dent," she said.

In a statement released the day before the OSBHE meeting, the OSL claimed that many students "have long standing misgivings about the expenditure of student incidental fees for intercollegiate athletics," and that the athletic departments

should be "more closely monitored and that deficit spending should not be tolerated."

"This is a real temporary situation," said Stickel. "It's a real gamble and everybody is hoping that the deficit will be resolved."

"We should not play athletics off of academics," Brand commented, and no general fund money will be used.

Brand said that he will ask the Athletic Department to undertake "one-year internal cost containment," which will not affect the construction of the Len Cassanova Complex at Autzen Stadium. Along with that, the university will look at implementing some economies of
