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in led to a trial but Marrocco was not convicted on any charges.

Marrocco's current research was approved last April by the University Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee after the University received a \$720,000 grant for cognitive neuroscience research from the James S. McDonnell Foundation of St. Louis and The Pew Charitable Trust of Philadelphia.

Despite several protests. SETA was not able to prevent the return of monkeys to campus for research or Marrocco's work with them

Both Marrocco and University Vice President for Research John Moseley said there is no truth to SETA's claim that Marrocco's work may be du-

'Marrocco's research has been carefully reviewed by the distinguished panel from the James S. McDonnell Foundation and the Pew Charitable Trusts," Moseley said, "They concluded, as did the UO Institutional Animal Care and Use Committee, that this research is very important and not duplicative of other studies.

'Of course other research has been performed on this subject, and Marrocco's research will build on this knowledge.

The SETA allegations have no credibility whatsoever. I can't imagine that any charges will ever be filed. This is just more harassment that animal rights activists are aiming at biomedical research, to the detriment of human health.

'I concur with that," Marrocco said, "It's a

preposterous claim.

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brief screening interview to answer questions about their expectations from the group. Students with unrealistic or inappropriate expectations will be referred to other groups or counselors. Davies said.

"This is not intended to be an intensive therapy group," he said. "It's an exploratory time. Part of it is answering my own questions and learning for myself.

Both Thompson and Davies

said they have been interested in examining the changing roles of men for a long time. 'It's something that's been at the back of my mind for a while," Thompson said.

The first group meeting will be held as soon as two or three interested students sign up; enrollment will be limited to nine or ten men at most.

Group members themselves will determine what issues to examine and which questions to explore. Thompson said. Possible areas of discussion include father-son relationships. relationships with women and redefining traditional male roles

"We want to keep an open mind about it," Davies said. 'We want to find out what's on men's minds at the University of Oregon in the summer of 1990. It's really up to the group members

If this summer's group meetings are successful, the Counseling Center may offer them again fall term or later next year, Thompson said.
