Barnes, a single mother who had lived at the shelter until she was evicted and later arrested. "We're staying. We have nowhere else to go. We do need to make a statement to the community about homelessness because it's knocking on the middle class' door right now.

lim Johnson, county administrator, said the group had printed flyers, inviting other homeless people to join them on the shelter's lawn.

Earlier in the week, someone donated a portable toilet to the campers, but with no running water and an unknown number of people arriving at the shelter. Johnson said the county was worried about sanitation at the site


'We didn't know how far it would go," Johnson said. "We decided it would be best to stop it at that point.

Also, because the lease with the Eugene School District expires Saturday, Johnson said the county wanted to return the property in the same condition in which it had been leased

Johnson said the county refused to take blame for the plight of those evicted from the shelter and for those who were arrested, insisting the county had done what it could to ease the plight of the homeless in

(Homelessness) has occupied the county's attention to a large extent," Johnson said, citing the \$680,000 a year the county spends on the problem in addition to the \$750,000 it allocated in April. "The reality is that local government cannot solve all of the problems in our area.
