# Academic star seeks world vision

### She mixes music. science, politics

University junior Dawn Ring is one of 25 students in the country who will receive a twovear \$14,000 Barry M. Goldwater scholarship, an award given annually to juniors who excel in science or mathemat-

The scholarship is the latest in a series of honors for Ring, who is a double major in chemistry and music

Earlier this year, she was initiated into the Alpha of Oregon chapter of Phi Beta Kappa, the national liberal arts honor society and was subsequently named one of its 1990 Oregon Six, initiates who are recognized for exceptional quality and breadth of their academic work

She is also a University Presidential Scholar, a Centurion Award winner, and a member of Druids honor society and Oregon Achievers among other groups.

Ring said she appreciates the honors and awards, but they are not her goal or motivation.

"It feels good to get recognition, although it's by far not the most important thing in my life," she said. "That's a part of me, but only one part. I'm working to build a world view for myself, and that's equally as important as academic hon-

Ring expects to spend at least two more years at the University as an undergraduate. She plans to eventually obtain a Ph.D in biochemisty and possibly a medical degree as well. She says she will probably pursue a career in research and teaching.

As a current member of the research team of University chemist Peter von Hippel, Ring is already making impressive strides. She is studying the chemical energy involved in copying DNA, the genetic coding material in cells. Her work with another researcher in the

field is the subject of an article to be published in the Journal of Biological Chemistry.

"She's very bright - she'll become an excellent scientist," von Hippel said. "I'm very pleased with the recognition she's gotten. She deserves it. She's doing excellent work in the lab, and we think very highly of her.

Ring's work in science is just one aspect of her life. She is also very involved in music and politics

After attending the University of Aberdeen in Scotland last year as part of the University's exchange program, her awareness of world events and politics increased.

"It changed my life." Ring said. "I began to question a lot of things.

When she returned to Eugene, she declared a minor in peace studies "because of my realization that there were so many human issues that I wanted to learn about.

Ring has been working with the Student Campaign for Disarmament and the University of El Salvador Sister University Project since her return, and in January she represented the University at a meeting of the Committee in Solfdarity with the People of El Salvador in Washington, D.C.

Someday she hopes to work in Central America, she said. Ring is also concerned about America's health care system and would like to focus some of her attention on national re-

Aside from science and politics. Ring is also pursuing her love for music, her second ma-

She started learning to play the violin at age 11; the following year her parents began chauffeuring her to Eugene from her hometown of Bend for lessons with University music professor Lawrence Maves. She is also an accomplished pianist.

'Music has been a part of my life since I was 7, and I didn't want to give it up," she said
