Man caught riding stolen bicycle

Earth First! blamed for \$2,000 in damages

PORTERVILLE, Calif. (AP) -Sequoia National Forest officials contend that Earth First! demonstrators caused about \$2,000 damage by vandalizing a logging road and equipment during Monday's "Redwood Summer" protest.

A citation charging violations of terms of a permit was issued against one protest leader, Mark Huntington of San-Francisco, and others will be said ranger Del Pengilley.

In addition, a \$250 bond accompanying a group camping permit issued to Brian Eckert of Springville may be forfeited on grounds that demonstrators violated permit language that bars vandalism, said Lee Belau, fire management officer.

Eckert said he could not be held responsible for the actions of the more than 100 demonstrators who hiked down a remote logging trail near Quak ing Aspen campground Monday morning.

'As a spokesman and organizer for Redwood Summer, I adhered to a non-violent and peaceful code," Eckert said.

Vandalism included letting the air out of six tires on a Caterpillar tractor. A thick cable was wrapped around one piece of machinery, and one end of the cable was stuck inside the engine compartment.

Other demonstrators rolled logs and boulders onto the logging road at various spots along
