# Greenpeace 'party' at nuke plant

The Seattle office of Greenpeace is organizing a "termination party" Saturday at the sites of two of Washington Public Power and Supply System's nuclear plants that have never been completed.

Corvallis Greenpeace member Bob Wolfe said the Northwest Power Planning Council voted two months ago to study the feasibility of completing and reopening the nuclear plants. They were left unfinished because the five-plant project went bankrupt before construction on the final two plants was completed. Wolfe said it is currently costing \$10,000,000 per year just to keep the plants from rusting.

Greenpeace is organizing the termination party because it opposes the opening of the plants.

"It is a misguided plan to supply the Northwest with unsafe, unstable forms of energy production," Wolfe said. "It's time to shut down and dismantle the plants and concentrate on developing long-term sustainable power sources and to work toward energy conservation."

Wolfe said the "party" will be attended by people from all over the Northwest. Greenpeace is expecting well over 1,000 people.

The gathering will include entertainment, bands, speakers and a "three-headed cow."

Greenpeace is providing buses to take interested parties to the site in Satsop, Wa.

A bus leaving Eugene will take off at 7:45 a.m. Saturday from the Growers Market building on Willamette Street near the AmTrak station.

Wolfe said a donation of \$5 is being asked for to cover the cost of the roundtrip bus ride which will include air conditioning, a bathroom and entertainment by folksinger Patrick Dodd. The bus will return Saturday around 7 or 8 p.m.

## Oregon volunteer service program opens

The Volunteers in Service to Oregon program, established by the 1989 legislature, is now in operation in Lane County.

VISTO allows social service volunteers between the ages of 16-19 the opportunity to earn vouchers toward a college education. Participants earn vouchers worth \$25 for every eight hours of service provided to selected agencies. Volunteers may earn up to \$1,800 annually

under the program.

The vouchers are redeemable at all eligible colleges and vocational schools for up to five years beyond the date issued.

The program was started by the Oregon Legislature in hopes that it would encourage volunteerism among the state's youth. Lane County has been granted \$49,925 for 1990-91.

Agencies participating in the program include Western Riv-

ers Girl Scout Council; the YMCA; Lane County Relief Nursery; McKenzie-Willamette Hospital; OSU extension Service; 4-H Development Program; Birth To Three; Association for Retarded Citizens and the American Red Cross.

States in a lengthy, offensive war against Iraq, DeFazio said.

Under the act, passed by Congress in 1973, any president who sends U.S. armed forces into hostilities has 48 hours to submit a report to both houses of Congress stating the circumstances of his action, the constitutional and legislative authority for it and the estimated "scope and duration of the hostilities."

DeFazio also criticized U.S. intelligence for predicting Iraq would not invade Kuwait and said the deployment of U.S. troops in Saudi Arabia was too slow and disorganized.

"We have huge logistical problems... tanks that are too big to fit in planes, helicopters that won't fit in planes," he said. "We need to develop a flexible military that is quickly deployable."

DeFazio also said that oil companies, not Iraq's invasion of Kuwait, are to blame for


jacking up gasoline prices and exploiting the consumers' fears.

"Consumers didn't panic because they thought there would be a shortage of gasoline," he said. "They panicked because they thought they would have to pay 15 or 20 cents more for gas the next day. I lay the entire blame at the door of the oil companies."

DeFazio said he expected the president or Congress to protect consumers from price gouging by oil companies.
