All-American Life Insurance Co. of Woodland Hills, Calif. is carrying next year's insurance plan for domestic students. The Hartford Insurance Co. of Hartford, Conn., will insure international students.

Student health insurance was one of the most urgent issues on campus last year, as the Prudential Co. threatened to end its coverage of students, citing few participants and high risk. The Student Health Insurance Committee then recommended mandatory health insurance for all students, a plan which was rejected in the April ASUO elections.

Both programs are almost identical to the Prudential plans, but offer better benefits.

Members of Students for the Ethical Treatment of Animals sent a letter to the state and county attorneys general in June asking them to investigate a research project of Dr. Richard Marrocco.

Marrocco's research on macaque monkeys duplicated work conducted by other scientists. Duplication, in some specific cases, constitutes scientific fraud. Marrocco and John Moseley, University vice president for research, said the charges were not valid.

SETA members decided not to pursue the investigation after Lane County District Attorney Doug Harcleroad wrote a letter to the group stating his office would not look into the case.

Taylor's Tavern, the wellknown blues bar and student hangout, closed its doors July 10. The bar at the corner of 13th Avenue and Kincaid Street, had been serving food, beer and the town's best-known blues music to University students since the early '70s. It had attracted nationally known acts, including Grammy Award-winner Robert Cray.

Manager David Dingman said he believed the building's owners did not want to renew the lease for the tavern, and so he decided to close the business before the lease ended.

Allegations that financial mismanagement was a cause for the failure of the business have been raised by lawyers for
