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varies from dorm to dorm.

"When I was an RA, my dorm got along really well," Torikai said. "During quiet hours I didn't want to ruin the community by breaking up get-togethers in the halls or in rooms." Torikai suggests that residents who must socialize gather in the lounge during quiet hours so other residents will not be disturbed.

"My dorm's quiet hours began at 8:30 before, but after going to one of the hall meetings, residents brought it up and it was changed to 10," Cogdell said. "So I recommend going to meetings and asking questions."

The following are hints RAs have for dorm residents to help make the best of, and perhaps survive, dorm life.

Laundry: "Sit with it," said Torikai, who once had her laundry stolen. "There are chairs and couches down there, so take text books with you and sit down with it."

Jones said most dorms have laundry rooms on each floor or at least in the basement. Each usually has four or more washers and dryers. It costs 35 cents to wash a load, and dryers are free.

Irons are prohibited in dorm rooms, but can be used in the halls, laundry rooms or in other specified areas, Torikai said.

Electric appliances: Most electric appliances are prohibited in dorm rooms — except small popcorn poppers. No, you can't have your coffeemaker or your fondue pot. Yes, they would seem the same as a popcorn popper. Don't ask.

Actually, it's not as dictatorial as it sounds. "When dealing with some 3,000 students, it's a concern because it's a fire hazard," Torikai said.

Residents may have refrigerators no larger than 20-by-20-by-24 inches. All appliances must be compatible with 110 volts 60 cycle voltage, Torikai said.

Refrigerators can be rented from the university for \$15 a term, or residents can buy their own.

Dorm food: Because cooking is not allowed in dorm rooms, most of the students eat at the dorm dining halls.

Tuomi said sack lunches and dinners can be arranged if residents cannot make it to any meal at the appointed times. This is helpful to students who work or have classes when meals are served.

Microwaves and vending machines are available in dorms and can sometimes provide alternatives to eating meals in the dining halls.

However, meals are included in the fees dorm residents pay

each term, and unless they have a lot of extra cash to fund regular runs to Burger King, they're stuck with what is served in the dining halls.

Peanut butter and jelly are available three times a day. *Bon appetit.*

Bike parking: "There's quite a bit available, but it usually fills up," Jones said. "Use a good lock, like a U-lock, and park it in a well-lit area. Registering bikes with Public Safety also helps a little bit."

Unlike the dorms, the University Inn has a bike cage, which Jones feels is safer.

"For those living in the dorms, I'd take it to my room if my roommate didn't mind and if there's room for it."

It is not recommended for students to lock their bikes with cable locks because those are easily cut.

Cleaning: There is a custodial worker on each floor in each dorm, "but they're not maids," Jones said.

Students are responsible for the maintenance of their rooms. Making the bed, picking up dirty socks and vacuuming are

up to residents. Custodians will not take responsibility for these tasks, and moms and dads are usually miles away.

Custodial workers clean the halls, stairways, lobbies, lounges and bathrooms.

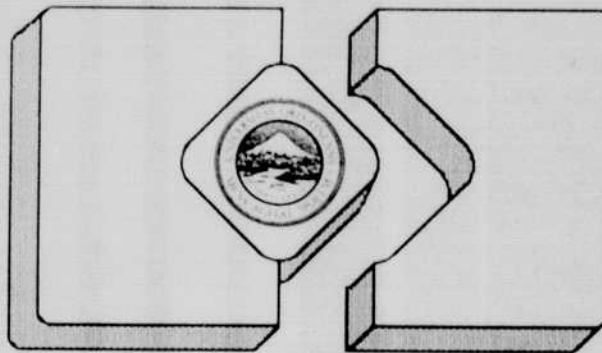
"You can't go in the bathrooms while they're being cleaned," Torikai said. Cleaning times for bathrooms are posted, and residents must use other bathrooms during those times.

"This could be a problem if someone gets up late and wants to take a shower and the custodian is working in the bathroom," she said. "But it's usually not a frequent problem."

Phones: Each dorm room now has its own phone and residents will be billed for their long-distance calls.

All the phones are marked on the bottom, but if not recovered, missing phones will cost residents \$25 to replace.
