Finance professor dies, had history of asthma

A University finance professor died of undetermined natural causes over the weekend. University officials said Monday.

Thomas Calmus, 58, died while working at his Elmira home Sunday afternoon. He was single and lived alone.

Calmus had a history of asthmatic problems, said Frank Ratti of the Medical Examiners office.

Calmus came to the University in 1967 after having served as an economist with the United States Treasury. His speciality was managerial economics and taxation.

He was studying the distribution of personal income in California, Oregon and Washington, as well as across the nation from 1950 to 1980 at the time of his

He received his bachelor's degree from Sacramento State (now Cal-State Sacramento) and his doctorate from the University of California, Berkeley.

Calmus also served as President of the Western Tax Association and was chair-

man of the University's Library Committee.

"He was very warm, friendly and well-liked," said Jim Reinmuth, dean of the College of Business Administration. "He taught hundreds of students in large classes by choice. He was dedicated to undergraduate teaching.

Calmus is survived by one brother and one sister. Services are to be announced.

KRMA to answer questions Wednesday

Organizers of a campus radio station tried to reassure representatives of other student groups that KRMA will have a place in its operations for any interested student, but deferred all questions about its board of directors until a Wednesday

Members of MEChA, the Black Student Union and other student groups have expressed concern that radio organizers are not taking affirmative action guidelines into account as they set up the station's internal structure.

However, at Monday's meeting and in a press release, KRMA Director James January stressed that he and other organizers welcomed participa-tion by as many different groups as possible.

Although January told about 50 students who showed up for Monday's weekly general interest meeting that he planned to devote the night to matters such as procuring music, discussing programming and planning a promotional campaign, he did answer several

questions from students about plans for structure and authority within the station.

At one point, Armando Morales of MEChA asked January how organizers planned to ensure that programming represented the desires of many different student groups.

Morales and another MEChA member, Freddy Vilches, said they and other student groups are concerned that the board be structured to give students the greatest voice in the station's operations and that the board represent as broad a spectrum of student interests as possible.
