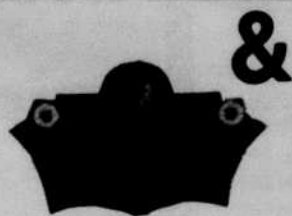


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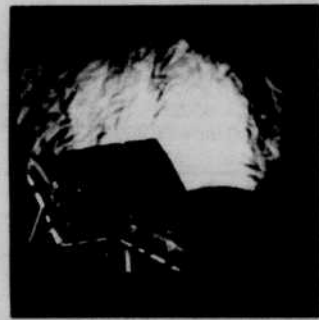

biennium.

Asked about other solutions, such as eliminating faculty positions, Brand said he could not predict the outcome, but with classes overcrowding now, operating at 92 percent of current service would be a serious setback to his goal of providing a world class university.

After several weeks of the school year have passed, Brand said that enrollment has only increased about 1 percent, despite some crowded classes.

Brand attributed the class crowding to shifting student interests. More students are enrolling in arts and science

courses, as indicated by a 20 percent increase in introductory chemistry classes. Brand congratulated faculty for adjusting well to the unexpected increase in attendance.

"I believe we can hold our own," Brand said of the University's ability to compete for grants, adding the University is very competitive and continues to see moderate growth in grant monies.

But the federal government has a tighter budget, he added, explaining why grants would not compensate for a loss of property tax funds.

"Each voter must make his or her own decision, but I am looking at the financial impact," Brand said.

tion, crews broke down their equipment. A smaller group followed crews to McAlister Hall where filming was expected to continue.

Three Eugene police cruisers were on hand outside the dorm and several campus security officers were present, but crews did not show up. Moreover, Elaine Green from the student conduct office was present.

Film crews, however, eluded protesters and resumed filming without incident at the Sigma Nu fraternity.

Filming was expected to continue at several locations until 3 a.m. Friday.

The University announced Wednesday that the Burger King commercial, which will air nationally in late October, would be shot at several campus locations, including the library and Johnson Hall.

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
