Abortion issue crucial in race

The four gubernatorial candidates on the Nov. 6 ballot offer Oregon voters a complex mix of convictions and intentions on issues facing the state, with the exception of one - abortion.

With the Democratic and Republican candidates disputing issues ranging from law enforcement to environmental ballot measures, and the Libertarian and independent candidates calling for a major overhaul of the government's present structure, this year's campaigning has diced the issues up, down, right and left.

But when it comes to abortion and two antiabortion ballot initiatives, gubernatorial disput-ing has been much less confusing — and much more bitterly fought.

Of the four candidates, Independent Al Mobley stands alone in his support for measures 8 and 10 and in his condemnation of Oregon's current abortion laws.

And with Mobley's campaign drawing voters who might have supported Republican Dave Frohnmayer in his close race against Democrat Barbara Roberts, a long-simmering dispute among Republicans over the heated abortion issue has come to a head.

'Abortion is barbaric,' Mobley said. "It is not the sign of a great society when women want to kill their babies in the womb. It's most unnatu-

Beyond condemning the practice. Mobley has also come out in support of both measures that would change the state's abortion laws. Measure 8. which he endorses first, would prohibit abortions except in cases of rape, incest or to save the life of the mother.

Mobley says he also supports Measure 10. which would require parental notification at least 48 hours before a minor could receive an abortion, but that it is "a moot point" because he believes it wouldn't be needed if Measure 8 passes.

The other three candidates oppose Mobley on the issue, and all three have said they stand against both measures on the grounds that the in-
