mendous season before suffering a fractured left ankle in the UCLA game that knocked him out for the season. However, he is still Oregon's second-leading receiver with 30 catches for 396 yards and leads the team with six touchdown receptions.

Castle is having a phenomenal year as the leader of the Duck defense, topping the team with 101 tackles and 15 pass deflections and was tied for second in interceptions with three.

Seniors Scot Boatright and Joe Reitzug shared the Bob Officer Award, given to a player or players who have made major contributions to the program despite physical adversity. Boatright, the team's center from Danville, Calif., has been bothered throughout his career by injuries, missing six games last season because of knee and ankle problems, and missing one game this season because of a pinched nerve in his back.

Reitzug, only 5-foot-10 and 170 pounds, is the team's leading receiver at split end, despite playing with cartilage damage in his knee the last half of the season.

The Tacoma, Wash., native leads the team with 35 receptions for 542 yards and also has two touchdowns. He is 15th on Oregon's all-time receiving list with 79 receptions.

Reitzug underwent arthroscopic surgery Monday and should be completely rehabilitated by the Freedom Bowl game.

Ducks fail to make Top 25, Colorado moves to No. 1

Oregon finished out of the Associated Press Top 25 football poll again this week.

The Ducks did receive 11 votes to check in at No. 29 overall after a 6-3 Civil War win over Oregon State, but have failed to re-enter the poll after losing to California 28-3 on Nov. 10.

Washington and USC were the only Pacific-10 Conference schools to crack the Top 25 as the Huskies moved up from 10th to ninth this week while the Trojans jumped from 19th to 18th.

Oregon and Washington are both off until bowl games on Dec. 29 and Jan. 1, respectively. The Ducks will meet Colorado State in the Freedom Bowl in Anaheim, Calif., while the Pac-10 champ Huskies will face the yet-to-be-determined Big-10 champ in the Rose Bowl in Pasadena, Calif.

USC will meet No. 7 Notre Dame this weekend and will then face Michigan State in the John Hancock Bowl in El Paso, Tex., on Dec. 30. The Irish were No. 1 a week ago but fell to seventh after a 24-21 loss to Penn State.

Colorado is the new No. 1 this week as the Buffaloes finished the regular season ranked No. 1 for the second straight year. Colorado. 10-1-1 overall, will meet Notre Dame in the Orange Bowl on Jan. 1.

Miami moved up to No. 2 this week while Georgia Tech, Brigham Young and Florida round out the top five. The second five are Texas, Notre Dame, Florida State, Washington and Nebraska.

While no other Pac-10 team made the poll besides Washington and USC, Cal and Arizona both received votes.

Colorado State to face final regular season foe

Colorado State, expected to be Oregon's opponent in the Dec. 29 Freedom Bowl in Anaheim, Calif., closes out the regular season this Saturday at Hawaii.

The Rams, 7-4 overall and 5-1 in the Western Athletic Conference, are coming off a 31-30 loss to Louisiana Tech, a game that ended a three-game winning streak for Coach Earle Bruce's team.

Colorado State will finish second in the WAC regardless of its outcome with the Rainbows. The Rams sewed up second place behind Brigham Young two weeks ago when they defeated Wyoming 17-8 at home in Fort Collins, Colo.

While the bowl appearance will be the second straight for the Ducks after last year's Independence Bowl, Colorado State will be

appearing in its first bowl game since 1948.

Bruce has turned the program around at Colorado State after coming over from Northern Iowa, where he coached for one season after being fired at Ohio State. The Rams were 5-5-1 a year ago and haven't had back-to-back winning seasons since 1975-76-77.

Offensively. Colorado State is led by the strong running trio of tailbacks Brian Copeland and Tony Alford and fullback Todd Yert. Yert and Alford both rank in the school's all-time top 10 list for career rushing yards.

Defensively, the Rams are led by cornerback Selwyn Jones, a junior who already is the school's career interception leader, and tackle Robert Chirico, one of the top sack leaders in school history.
