significance to the levels of cuts and the type of cuts."

Rep. Larry Campbell, a Eugene Republican who will be next year's House speaker, said that with Oregon voters having just passed a tax-limiting initiative, the sooner some new form of taxing is referred to the voters, the higher the chance of it being refused.

Rep. Peter Courtney, a Salem Democrat who will be the House minority leader next session, believes that chances of seeing a new tax proposal in 1991 are slim. "I just don't know how to get a revenue bill out of the House," he said, believing that the Republicans' newly won House majority will make such a proposal next year even less likely.

"Legislators by definition don't act until they have to act," he said. "Measure 5's real impact is not known right now, so you may find a good number of legislators saying, 'We don't have to act.' The problem is how much budget cutting will we have to do before we get to a new source of revenue?"

Courtney said he believes Republican eagerness to cut spending may clash with Dem-

ocratic attempts to preserve government programs, resulting in a "real log jam between the two juggernauts."

Because of budget disputes he sees in the legislative future, Courtney said a new tax proposal probably won't be referred to voters until 1992.

"There's a good chance we won't see anything next year, depending on how much damage is done by Measure 5," he said. "I think something will happen in 1992. By then we won't just be talking about Measure 5; we will be experiencing it."

But while Campbell acknowledges that a sales tax referral is likely, he believes the responsibility of initiating and promoting such a proposal may fall primarily into the laps of governor-elect Barbara Roberts and Superintendent of Public Instruction Norma Paulus, both of whom have called for a sales tax.

"Over the last 20 years the Legislature has lost a lot of credibility," he said. "I'm not sure that if the Legislature comes up with anything that the voters would accept it."

Campbell suggested that Roberts and Paulus put together the basics of a sales tax package, letting the Legislature "develop the technical aspects of it."
