Two Duck wrestlers take individual titles

Despite missing two-time all-American Dan Vidlak, the Oregon wrestling team was able to place sixth at the Mat Town Open wrestling tournament last weekend in Lock Haven, Pa.

The Ducks scored 73 points despite not entering anyone in two weight classes, including the 118-pound class where Vidlak was sidelined with a knee injury

Penn State won the team title with 110 points while Syracuse was second with 921/2 points. Rider. North Carolina State and Bucknell rounded out the top five

Oregon got several outstanding individual efforts to help offset the loss of Vidlak. Particularly helpful were Scott Glenn and Curt Strahm, who each won their respective weight classes.

Glenn had five victories to win the 142-pound title over Tim Tothka of Drexel. Glenn defeated Tothka 5-3 in the championship match.

Strahm won the 190-pound weight class with a 12-8 decision over Brian Burns of Bucknell.


