Paint waste dug up at Riverfront

The University has alerted the Oregon Department of Environmental Quality that a contractor conducting a secondphase environmental assessment of the Riverfront Research Park property has dug up several containers apparently holding paint waste materials.

The paint was dug up in the Silva orchard parcel of the property.

"As required by environmental regulations, we have reported to the DEQ and other appropriate agencies what we have found buried in the northwest corner of the Silva parcel and what we are doing to secure and contain the excavated material," said Thomas Hicks, director of the University's Office of Environmental Health and Safety.

The DEQ is expected to review the proposed cleanup and disposal plan and, based on sampling results due in about two weeks, to notify University officials of how the DEQ wants

the University to proceed,

Hicks said.

"It's likely that we will package the materials and send them to an approved disposal site, but we'll probably need to wait to do that until we have the results of the sampling of the materials and can be sure of what we have found," he said.

Last December, the University hired L.R. Squier Associates, Inc. of Lake Oswego to conduct a preliminary assessment of the entire research park property.

After completing the first phase assessment of all four parcels that make up the entire research park property, the consultants recommended that the University undertake further evaluation of several areas.

The Silva orchard parcel was one such site.

The consultants had located one partially buried 55-gallon drum that was crushed and apparently empty in the Silva parcel during their initial exploration

In accordance with Squier's advice, University backhoe operators earlier this month began excavating where the partially buried drum was located. They found a one or two-gallon gallon can of paint in the test strip there.

At this point further excavation stopped, and the consultants swept the entire pit with a sophisticated metal detector. Squier obtained several readings at the partly excavated test pit and in several other locations, Hicks said.

On Nov. 20. Staton Construction backhoe crews hired by Squier dug up three 55-gallon drums and six to 12 five-gallon pails. All contained what are thought to be paint waste.

Hicks said that, depending upon the sample results, additional monitoring may be necessary to determine if any groundwater contamination has occurred.

Police investigating assault accusations

Police are still investigating the incident, and no charges have been filed. However, the two subjects filed a fourth-degree assault complaint against the Sigma Nu member.


