women a disservice if there is a fairly obvious distinction between the two policies," he said.

Allison Baker, executive assistant to University President Myles Brand. said the discrepancy has not had an adverse effect on how sexual harassment cases are treated on campus.

My sense of watching complaints being filed is that we're not restricting it to touching or attempted touching." she said. "The issue will be whether something is wrong here."

Baker said the University is finding fault with the behavior of alleged sexual harassers. However, she said the discrepancy between the federal and state policies should be cleared up, to send a clearer message about what behavior is not acceptable.

Other issues being considered by the new committee are those which involve more than just the legal aspects. The committee has raised the question of how much support there is for students who have been harassed in addition to support for faculty who have been accused.

The Office of Student Advocacy

provides some resources for students who have been harassed. Drescher said she can assist students in filing complaints with the Office of Affirmative Action, collect evidence, and help find remedies to the situation other than legal action.

Drescher said sometimes a student wants help to get out of the harasser's class and complete the credits through other means, such as through a department head.

She said she would like to see stronger protection for students against retaliation if they file a complaint, and more effective disciplinary methods for offending faculty

Effective discipline depends on the department head's reception to this kind of grievance, Drescher said.

'If he or she trivializes it, we have a tremendous difficulty getting discipline." she said

Drescher said harassers are often simply encouraged to find employment elsewhere, resulting in more offenses at a different university. She said there are cases of the University unwittingly hiring faculty with a record of harassment behind them.

Influenza vaccine MAY be given to persons wishing to reduce their chances of catching the flu, persons who provide essential community services, and students or others in schools or colleges.



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
