five percent cuts were made, but that "the decision has been made not to pursue that request until after the governor makes further recommendations."

"We are not ready to be trying to make those kinds of projections at this time," he said.

Nevertheless, Quinzer said the lower revenue projections does dim the prospects of a faculty salary increase and more money for university libraries, both of which Gov. Neil Goldschmidt included in his "budget preview" in September.

Quinzer said that while the lower income prediction "doesn't necessarily make those initiatives impossible," a revenue shortfall would mean that "any new initiatives are going to be very difficult."

But Rep. Van Vliet cautioned against









guessing at where cuts might be made.

"As far as we know, the state has talked about a 10 percent cut," he said. "Just how that trickles through the system, and to what extent that is done, I just can't tell you."


House minority leader-elect Peter Courtney, D-Keizer, said he believes that with so much talk about budget cuts, the real issues the state must face next year are being overlooked.

"There has been a lot of weeping and wailing and jumping out of windows about Measure 5 and budget cuts, and not much talk about the real issues," he said.

Courtney listed the increasing numbers of reported child abuse and pollution in the state's rivers as problems that he believes are being overshadowed by discussion of budget issues. "No one has talked about human suffering, human pain. ... All the talk is about cuts and sales taxes."
