Delayed students to keep places in classes

University students who missed the first day of classes Monday because of icy road conditions north of Salem last weekend will not lose their spots in classes that require mandatory attendance for the first two sessions.

Provost Norman Wessels has sent a letter to deans of all University departments requesting that instructors not admit students on waiting

lists into their classes in lieu of students who could not attend classes on Monday because of bad weather.

If students can prove they were in an area affected by bad weather on Monday, they will not lose their places in classes, said Paul Holbo, vice provost of academic affairs.

Students who are concerned that they will be replaced in classes they have registered for should go to department offices and explain their situation, he said. Holbo said the school is especially concerned with students enrolled in writing and other classes in the College of Arts and Sciences.

The University's administrative drop policy, begun in fall 1989, has been modified this year to a mandatory attendance requirement.

Students who don't show up for the first two class meetings of the term are no longer officially dropped from classes but rather forfeit their places to students on the waiting list.

The drop policy was originally designed to help students on class waiting lists by ensuring that students attend the classes they sign up for.

"Departments as of last term are not doing any dropping of students through the registrar's office." said Assistant Registrar Mark Turner.

It is the responsibility of the students who are replaced in classes to file an add/drop form with Oregon Hall.
