

Wrestlers remain unbeaten, win 16th straight

Oregon's 21st-ranked wrestling team improved to 5-0 overall Tuesday by gaining its 16th consecutive dual meet victory in a 19-16 Pacific-10 Conference win at Cal-State Fullerton.

Scott Glenn's 14-4 decision

over the Titans' Donnie Kieran put Oregon ahead for good, 9-5. Holding the number seven ranking for 142-pound wrestlers, Glenn upped his individual record to 18-2-1 with the win.

"It was a tough one right from the start," Oregon Coach Ron Finley said. "They were a very, very competitive team,

but we fought hard all the way."

Curt Strahm, ranked 12th in the 190-pound class, earned a technical fall to seal the victory for the Ducks and moved his record to a near-perfect 16-1.

Two other Oregon wrestlers won their individual weight category.

Dan Vidlak, the Ducks' na-

tionally second-ranked 118-pounder, added another win to his 8-0 record by scoring an 8-4 triumph over Fullerton's Michael Grubbs.

Twelfth-ranked 167-pounder Mat Sprague won his class with a 15-12 decision.

In the 126-pound class, Oregon's Pat Hira took a 5-5 draw with Titan Jeff Maes, and Dar-

ren Gustafson also received a 1-1 tie in the 158 class with CSF wrestler Ron Cottrell.

Fullerton dropped to an even 4-4 record, 0-2 in the Pac-10, with the loss.

The Ducks ended their California road trip last night in a conference dual meet at Stanford. Results from the meet were not available at press time.

will argue with that a great deal, but it seems like poetic justice to me, and the revenue will be about the amount we need."

In Lane County the most pressing need is for food purchasing funds, Frengle said. The funds are needed to keep the 62 food distribution agencies open.

"We're concerned about the food purchasing money right now," Frengle said. "But in Lane County we're in pretty good shape because we have local officials who understand the problem and we have their support. In a lot of places, that's not the case."

Among the recommendations was the extension of state funding for the Task Force on Hunger to 1995. The task force would examine barriers to assistance programs, assess unmet needs, examine participation rates of various programs, and monitor the effect of economic changes on the programs.
