diversity and economic equality, committee Chairman Frank Geltner said.

King's message is still of importance today "mainly because what he fought for is still out of reach," Geltner said, adding that he hopes students, staff and faculty rededicate their commitment to "ways in which they can help realize Martin Luther King's dream."

Students who cannot or choose not to attend Monday's activities should still use the day to reflect on what King stood for, said junior Robert Boyd.

"Remember the things (King) did, the accomplishments he did in a short time," Boyd said. He said King's message is more important now than ever before. Many of the problems of inequality that King addressed are "not as visible now but they're still there," he said.

University freshman Meredith Maier said she believed most students probably would not attend the daylong conference of workshops and speakers planned by the University. electing instead to use the day "as just another holiday."

"I'm probably going skiing." she said.

Sophomore Heather Wright said she plans to spend the weekend at home in Portland, where she and her family will go to a local school to attend speeches about King and his work.

"It's good we have a holiday to observe (King), but his message is something we should be aware of every day," she said. "In daily life I try to live up to the principles King stood for."

Besides Monday's conference, other workshops, speakers and events are planned throughout this week.

Students can pick up yellow "Celebrate Diversity" decoration tape free of charge in the EMU student activities resource office area, and Martin Luther King Jr. posters are on sale at the EMU Main Desk.

University organizations sponsoring King celebration activities include the Black Student Union, ASUO, Students Against Apartheid, the greek system, Gay and Lesbian Alliance and the Women's Center.

made the decision to contract with Coca-Cola. Carr "found the loophole to continue offering Pepsi as a matter of choice. We really did what we could to

offer a choice." Carr admitted he was "perplexed" by the boycott, and said that campus food service sales are important to matters of student employment.


"This will only hurt the students, and student employment. Students could lose their jobs and prices could rise. It's really not a productive means to an end."

But Carr did say that he supports the desires of the University's students, and understands how "people want to express themselves and the issues they care about."

Anderson, however, said that "for such a politically oriented school, (I'm) surprised everyone's been standing around about this."
