Shabazz, seminars cap week

The University's celebration of civil rights leader Rev. Martin Luther King Jr. continues Monday with a daylong conference highlighted by keynote speaker Attallah Shabazz.

The opening ceremonies of the conference are at 10 a.m. in the EMU Ballroom. After a Native American blessing, ASUO co-Presidents Kirk Bailey and Sheila Stickel, University President Myles Brand, higher education Chancellor Thomas Bartlett and Corvallis City Manager Gerald Seals will speak.

The Oregon Jazz Ensemble, directed by jazz studies professor Steve Owen, will then perform "Celebration for King," an original composition by Tim Clarke, a graduate student in the School of Music.

Birr said a third firebomb was found by a vehicle parked near the adjacent Marine Corps building, but the fire caused by that device went out without doing any damage.

The fires were contained by 7:12 p.m., Birr said.

"It was not a major fire by

any stretch of the imagination," he said.

Traffic was not restored until about 8:15 p.m. while police and fire personnel continued to investigate the buildings.

Although damage in the storage area appeared to be minimal. Birr said there was no damage estimate and did not know if any office records or equipment had been destroyed.

While there have been several reported bomb threats in the Eugene area since the war against Iraq began. Birr said there had been no previous explosions. Threats are common in Eugene, he said, but bombs and firebombs are not.

Several Federal Bureau of Investigation agents went to the scene and both the Portland and Washington D.C. bureau offices were notified, said special agent Steve Gomez of the Eugene office.
