Professor wins major music award

The frustration of standing for hours practicing the violin as a child caused Robert Hladky to switch to the cello a decision he has never regret-

Hladky, a University cello professor, was recently recognized for his cello mastery as a recipient of the American String Teachers Association 1991 Citation for Exceptional Leadership and Merit.

Hladky will receive the award during the 1991 ASTA national convention in Seattle,

He said he felt surprised initially at receiving one of the association's highest annually awarded honors and later felt 'deeply honored.'

Ironically, he said he might never have developed his level of cello skill if he hadn't grown frustrated with playing the vio-

"My father is a violinist and an old-fashioned European, so we had a lesson every Saturday morning." Hladky said. "He made me stand for my lessons. I was about 11 years old and as

kids talk with their parents I said, 'How is it you get to sit and I have to stand? I'd like to play something where I'd get to sit down.

'One day he walked in holding a cello," he said. "I took to it like a duck takes to water. That backfired somewhat. Now I get tired of sitting.

Hladky came from a "musical family" and began performing music at age four. "I've been exposed to music all my life." he said. "My parents took me to hear all the great artists when I was young and it made an undeniable impression on me.

Since that time, he has performed professionally and instructed students on the cello. This year marks his 40th year teaching college level cello and string bass, he said. He has taught at the University for 31

As a professional, he has served as principal cellist with the Eugene Symphony, the Eastman Chamber Orchestra, the Oregon Bach Festival, the Peter Britt Festival and orchestras in Rochester, New York,

Columbus, Ohio, and Oklahoma City, Oklahoma.

Currently, he performs with the Oregon Mozart Players and is an active recitalist.

Despite the hours of practice and the amount of dedication needed to master the instrument, Hladky has done just that. He said music is a valuable part of his life.

"Music is almost a religion for me." he said.

Hladky's cello teachers included Luigi Silva of the Eastman and Juilliard Schools of Music and his father, Frank Hladky. At Eastman, Hladky received the performer's certificate, a masters and doctorate of Musical Arts degrees.

He and three other University music professors will perform Feb. 25 as part of the Faculty Artist Series.

The group, which includes Lawence Maves on the violin, Leslie Straka on the viola and Barbara Palmer on the piano. will perform pieces by Beethoven. Martinu and Schumann. The concert will be held at 8 p.m. in Beall Hall.
