

Men's tennis slams Westmont

The Oregon men's tennis team showed Tuesday how much better it can perform when it doesn't have any problems getting to a match.

Just five days after having to forfeit a match in the Nevada Bob's Invitational in Las Vegas due to airplane problems, the Ducks (5-7) returned home and soundly defeated Westmont College 61/2-21/2 Tuesday afternoon.

Freshman Lee Kirner gave Oregon a strong start at first singles with a 6-2, 6-1 victory over Westmont's Steve McRaxin

In all, the Ducks claimed victories in five of the six singles matches with wins by Ryan Marasigan, Nick Smith, Doug Root and Ted Tho-

Chris Gladwell, at fifth singles, was the lone singles loser, dropping a 6-4, 6-4 decision to Westmont's Steve Hirons.

The two teams split at second and third doubles while the first singles match was scrapped after two sets so Westmont could catch a plane out of town, creating the unusual final score

Tuesday's match was Oregon's fourth in five days, including three in the Las Vegas tournament

The team was supposed to leave Eugene last Thursday in order to arrive in time to play a match Friday morning, but after a five-hour delay the flight was canceled.

Oregon finally left early Friday morning and landed in Las Vegas in time to rush over and lose a 5-2 decision to Northern Arizona Friday afternoon. Buzz Summers, the Ducks' coach, said the team was physically exhausted and unable to perform against Northern Arizona due to the travel problems

The Ducks rebounded on Saturday to defeat Lovola-Marymount 5-1, in another match that wasn't completed.

Summers was unhappy about missing a match but was otherwise pleased with the weekend.

"It was good for us to be tested," he said, "and to get experience against other teams.

His team's next challenge will be Feb. 27th at the University of Portland.

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
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



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
