Some housing needs will be met

Current proposals to limit enrollment to 16,000 for the next academic year have the University re-evaluating the need for new student housing, a University vice president said

Dan Williams, University vice president for administration, said the University still plans to build between 45 and 60 family housing units, for which it was allocated funds from the Legislative Emergency Board last January. The University will then assess the housing demand situation for next year.

The University has been at odds with local members of the state Legislature for some time over the role it should play in providing housing for its students.

A bill recently passed in the House would require the University to submit an annual report to the state board comparing the University's provisions for student housing with other institutions in the Pacific-10 Conference.

Williams said additional student housing may not be necessary if enrollment cuts are implemented next year because lower enrollment will decrease the demand for student housing. He also said the cost of building new student housing would be transferred onto the students through increased fees.

But with tuition rising as a result of Ballot Measure 5, it is not right to add additional costs to the fees students pay, Williams said

"It is not fair to obligate students with unnecessary debt," he said. "It does not seem like the time to go past our commitment. (People) have to remember that students have to pay for the debt.

Williams said the only advantage to having the University as a landlord would be cheaper rent, but this is not really an advantage because all students would pay higher fees to compensate for debts amassed by the Universi-

Williams said the University intended to build 100 to 150 units, but will start smaller because of the reduced enrollment level.

'If you look at the community, there are vacant apartments all over campus," Williams said. "It has been wise for us to have been as cautious as we have been so far.'

But what it comes down to is not jeopardizing the institution's interest. Williams said

The cautious plan the University is taking has the support of the Lane County housing authority

Jim McCoy, community development coordinator, said the housing authority is under contract with the University to facilitate whatever projects arise in the housing process.

McCoy said it takes effort on the part of all involved to cure the housing situation in Eugene, and he believes the University is making a concerted effort




