Freshman Sporcich wins basketball MVP

Freshman Debbie Sporcich, who led the Oregon women's basketball team in scoring and rebounding this past season, was named the team's most valuable player Sunday at the team's basketball banquet.

The 19-year-old native of Pasco. Wash.. was the first Oregon freshman to lead the club in scoring since Bev Smith in 1976-77. Sporcich also broke Alison (Lang) Robertson's single-season freshman scoring record of 400 points.

Sporcich, a member of the Pacific-10 Conference's all-freshman team, averaged 15 points a contest and was third in the conference with 10 rebounds a game.

Kelly Blair, who redshirted her sophomore basketball year to concentrate on track, was named as the Harry Ritchie Scholar-Athlete Award winner. In addition to practicing with the women's basketball club and preparing for spring track, Blair managed a 4 00 grade point average during winter

Skipper likely for Pepsi meet

Oregon javelin thrower Art Skipper will likely compete in Saturday's Pepsi Team Invitational, despite suffering from a torn ligament in his left foot.

Kim Terrell, Oregon's head track trainer, said Monday that Skipper suffered a second-degree sprain of his left ankle in last Saturday's dualmeet win over Washington.

Skipper said he would be able to throw from just a standing position in this weekend's meet, which Terrell confirmed. While Skipper did partially tear the ligament on the top of his foot, the injury could have been much worse if the whole ligament had torn.

Terrell said Skipper is receiving ice treatment three times a day through a special boot that helps compress the ice around the soft tissues near the ligament.

Terrell also said Skipper shouldn't have any long-term effects from the injury.

"He'll probably be 100 percent in two weeks," she said. Two Oregon tracksters were honored Monday by the Pacific-10 Conference for their roles in the dual-meet wins over Washington.

Heath Howington was named the men's field athlete of the week while Rosie Williams was the women's track athlete of the week.

Howington smashed his old personal record of 51-1 in the shot put by six feet, winning the competition with a put of 57-1.
