Brand says program cuts only part of slow process

Deciding which programs are to be cut in the wake of Measure 5, and facing the resulting loss of faculty members and students has been a painful experience. University President Myles Brand said at a Friday meeting of the Eugene City Club.

"Anyone who has been in business knows that restructuring is a slow and painful process," he said.

"I felt like Sophie in the movie *Sophie's Choice* who got off the train in (a Jewish concentration camp) and was asked, 'Which one of your children do you wish to live?'" Brand said at a Friday meeting of Eugene City Club members.

"When people drown the first thing to go is the digits and then the arms and the legs. The torso is preserved. Well, we've had some healthy limbs amputated," he said.

University program and faculty cuts will have "monumental consequences" for the Eugene-Springfield community, Brand said. The cuts will effect the community as would the loss of a \$20 million business.

Brand said the loss of 2,000 students and 200 faculty mem-

bers from budget cuts is only the beginning.

"One half of our university will be gone by July 1, 1993, unless we find ways to find replacement tax revenue," Brand said. "Social services and education in this state will fall off the cliff."

"Don't wait to see if my prediction is true, but unfortunately I have a good track record for predicting disaster."

The University's date to "fall off the cliff" is May 1992, which is sooner than other state agencies because higher education must give their employees a one-year notice before laying them off, Brand said.

Brand urged City Club members to support a bill recently proposed by Rep. Carl Hosticka, D-Eugene, which would eliminate the one-year timely notice requirement.

Brand said he is convinced there will be tax restructuring, but the "critical question is when."

"Notice I have not said what the right tax restructuring should be because I don't know," Brand said.

"Should it be a sales tax or involve a business tax or a luxury tax? I'm not equipped to answer that but I want the people who do know that to get on the stick," he said.
