### Huskies top Ducks in tennis duals

Oregon may be inching closer to Washington in women's tennis, but the Huskies proved they still own the Pacific-10 Northern Division after sweeping Oregon and Washington State to win the conference's dual-meet tournament.

Washington (16-7) wrapped up its seventh consecutive conference crown with an 8-1 Sunday morning win over the host Ducks. Oregon blanked Washington State 9-0 on Friday and finished the season at 15-8, including wins in six of their last seven outings.

"This was probably the best match we've played all season," Oregon Coach Tom Greider said of the Oregon-Washington clash. "Every match was tight."

"We're making progress but we're still about two or three players short of where they are."

Junior Mary Reilly led the Husky assault, defeating Oregon's Hilary Roberts (6-2, 6-2) at first singles and combining with teammate Cindy Olejar for a 7-5, 6-1 win at first doubles.

Sunday's match marked the end of Roberts' four-year career.

"I'm happy with the way I played today, especially doubles," Roberts said. "Singles was good but doubles was a lot of fun."

Despite losing the match, Roberts and teammate Krissy Barger played some of the best tennis of the year in the No. 1 doubles match. They led 3-0 and 5-3 in the first set before falling to the stronger pair from Washington.

"The first four games of that

doubles match was the best I've ever seen at the college level," Greider said. "I have never seen emotion and intensity like I did in those first five or six games."

Freshman Katie Glynn collected Oregon's lone victory on Sunday by dusting Washington's Becky Clayton 6-2, 6-1 at fifth singles. The win was Glynn's second against a Washington opponent this season.

"It was great to see her play well," Greider said of Glynn. "I hope to be able to look forward to three more years of that type of play."

Oregon's 9-0 win over Washington State on Friday wasn't as easy as it sounds as the Ducks were pushed to three sets four times by the Cougars.

"I wasn't very happy about how we played against Washington State," Greider said.

### Bruin pitchers stop Oregon in twinbill

To score, one must get on base, and Oregon's softball team did little of either in two losses to UCLA at Howe Field Sunday afternoon.

In the 4-0 and 7-0 losses to the top-ranked Bruins, only five Oregon players were able to reach base. The defeats deflated Oregon's record to 19-21 overall.

"If you can get two or three hits against these kids, you're doing a good job," Oregon Coach Tami Brown said of the Ducks' 2 for 45 effort at the plate.

In the first contest, Julie

Cavanaugh's bunt up the first-base line in the seventh inning broke up a no-hit bid by Bruins' pitcher Heather Compton.

Of the seven UCLA runs, six were earned by Oregon freshman pitcher Rachelle Taylor, whose record fell to 9-12.

Fellow freshman pitcher Natasha Dumoski fared better than her teammate, allowing only three earned runs in the second game, but the end result was the same as UCLA pitcher Lisa Fernandez helped out her own cause, hitting two for three.

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
