Students voice protest on military presence

Students concerned about the presence of military recruiters on campus gathered Friday on the steps of Johnson Hall to voice their views.

Although the students all spoke out against the military, some were opposed primarily to the military's discrimination against gays, lesbians and bisexuals. Others were more concerned about military-funded research at the University.

Oregon Administrative Rules state discrimination is not allowed at the University, said Sue Dockstader, co-director of

the Gay, Lesbian and Bisexual Alliance.

"Yet because the University gets Department of Defense money, they think they can bend the rules a little," she said.

Todd Hausman, a member of Students for the Ethical Treatment of Animals, said military research on animals is being conducted at the University "at the expense of the taxpayers and at the expense of endangered species."
