By joining these councils, the NPHC will demonstrate its willingness to partner with existing greek activities, he said.

Although they are willing to join the Interfraternity and Panhellenic councils, differences in rush procedures and community service goals, as well as greatly differing histories, lead black University students to believe that a separate NPHC is also necessary.

NPHC proponents and existing greek council leaders spoke about the proposal recently in a "Colors" forum to discuss issues of differences and common interests.

Anita Stacy, Panhellenic president, agrees with Anderson that a separate black greek council would be helpful in serving student needs.

"We are just now learning about our differ-

ences," Stacy said. "To bring in a new council will help us to support each other without losing our identities."

Barry Nicholson, vice president of the Interfraternity Council, said he is interested in a "partnership of councils."

Alpha Kappa Alpha member Richardra Truesdale said she is excited about the relationships that are forming between traditionally black and dominantly white greek organizations.

"Since the Colors forum, we've gotten a lot of calls," Truesdale said. "People should know that (the AKA sisters) have a really strong bond as sisters and minorities on a predominantly white campus."

"This is a package I don't think the administration can refuse," Anderson said. "The NPHC will bring help in recruiting students of color who do not otherwise find the support they need at this University."

# Judge sentences Mandela

JOHANNESBURG, South Africa (AP) — A judge sentenced Winnie Mandela to six years in prison Tuesday on kidnap and accessory-to-assault charges, saying the wife of black leader Nelson Mandela had shown no remorse for the crimes.

Mrs. Mandela stood silently and showed no emotion as the sentence was read, but outside the court, she raised her fist defiantly to a cheering crowd and declared: "The struggle goes on!"

The judge, who convicted Mrs. Mandela on Monday after a politically sensitive three-month trial, freed her pending an appeal that could take months. South Africa has no jury trials; verdicts and sentencing are done by the judge.

The conviction and stiff sentence for his wife could put pressure on Nelson Mandela to take a harder line against the white-led government, because Mrs. Mandela's militant followers see her as a political martyr.

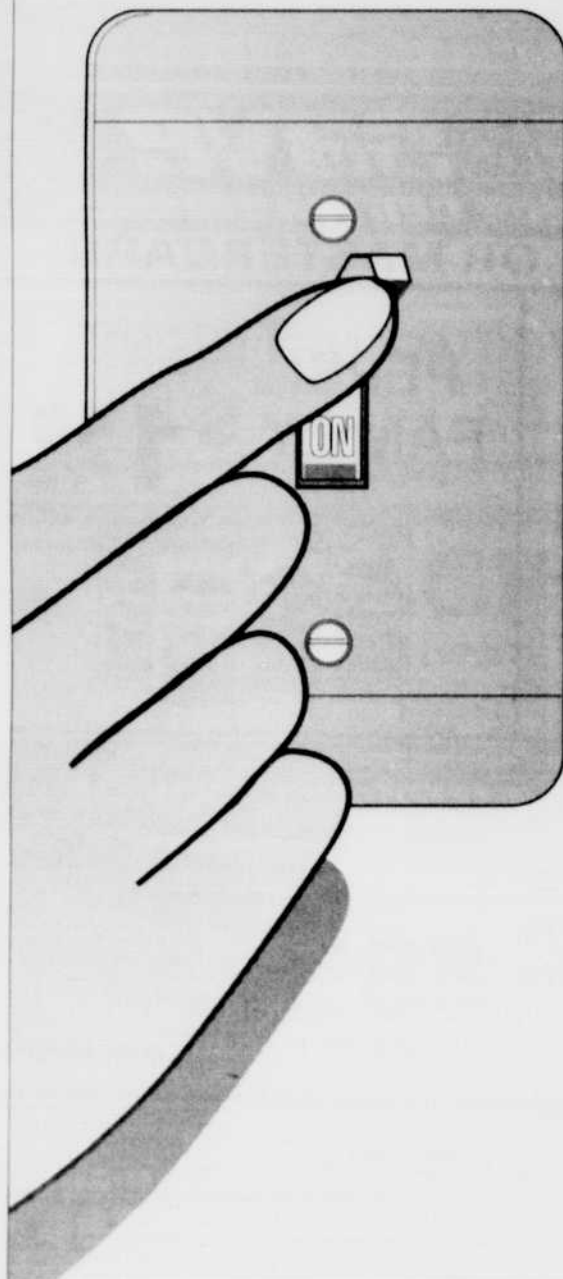

# We Need Your Energy to Help Plan Eugene's Future.

Beginning in June, the committee will meet regularly over a six-month period to study various power and energy management options, and evaluate scenarios which offer varied costs, benefits and risks in meeting Eugene's future electricity needs.

Half of the ten-member committee will be selected randomly from EWEB customers who apply for the committee. EWEB Commissioners will select the other half to assure that the views of a wide range of customers, such as low income, commercial and industrial, as well as local government and citizen interest groups, are included. EWEB customers both inside and outside of Eugene's city limits are invited to apply for the committee.
