tection of the speaker, or artist. "when the government chooses to support art.

The last principle is that the government is not a sponsor of what is produced by any artist it funds. He compared this principle to the "soapboxes" in London where anyone is free to speak to public audiences.

He said it shows the strength of democracy "when the gov-

ernment provides the platform for free speech.

Frohnmayer, who was chosen to speak at the commencement by the graduating class. closed his address by encouraging the 164 graduates to respect differences in society.

"Decency emerges from fundamental rights to be different and the social right to respect those differences," he said.

Two honorary awards were also presented at the commencement. Leslie J. Harris, an associate law school professor, received the Orlando J. Hollis Faculty Teaching Award

"No other award could mean as much to me as this," Harris

The Meritorious Service award, usually presented to non-faculty members, was given Chapin Clark, retiring associate dean of the law school. Clark is retiring after teaching at the school for over 30 years.

'We decreased the amount of money the was allocated for speakers, because they were getting too much compared to what other groups were getting." Nhem said.

The other three budgets were vetoed and restored after some clarifications were made.

The ASUO has the right to veto any budget until any questions are answered." Nhem

She said she is satisfied with the job the ASUO did on budget allocations this year, spending \$9,000 less than last year.

"Our office did our best to keep the fees low," she said. "If it wasn't for the impact of Ballot Measure 5, fees would have stayed the same.


