# Belafonte coming to Hult Center

He's been called "the consummate entertainer" with a career that dates back more than 30 years. Not only is he an icon in the music industry, his activities in the human rights struggle are widely respected. His awards and recognitions encompass both worlds—as an artist and a humanitarian.

"The role of the artist is to not only show life as it is, but to show life as it should be," said Harry Belafonte in a press release. He believes that both his work for human rights and his artistic pursuits have given him a productive and balanced life.

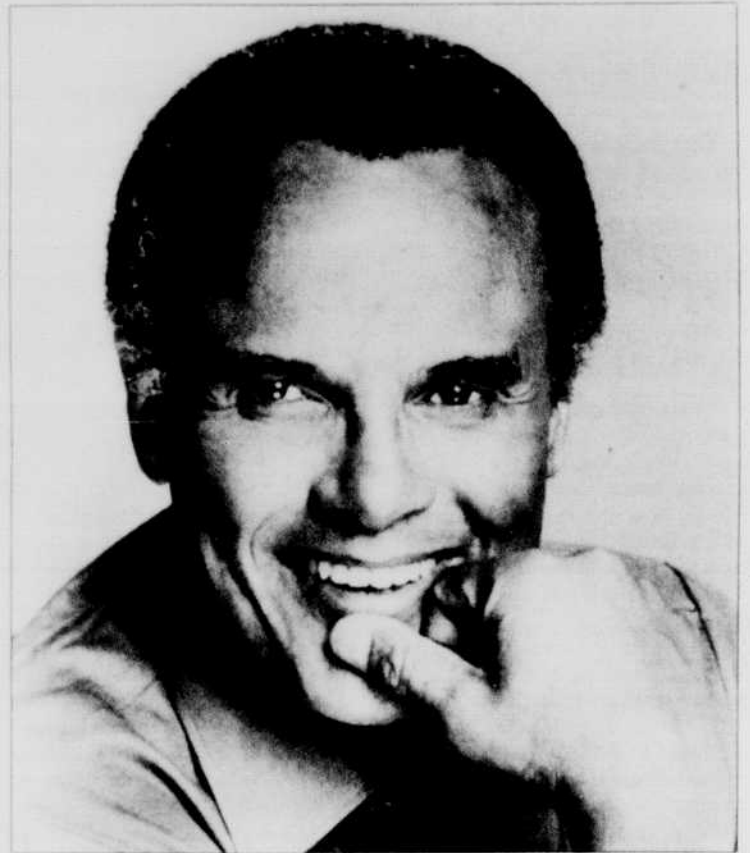
"Belafonte has done more than just pursue his own personal interests," said Suzanne Kaykas of Regal Productions, promoter of the Belafonte concert. "He's done a lot for others and people appreciate that."

"It's going to be a great show. He's very personable and he makes his audience feel like they're experiencing much more than just the entertainer in him."

Born in Harlem, N.Y., Belafonte moved with his mother to Jamaica where he lived for five years, immersed in the cultural variety of island life.

Belafonte returned to New York to attend high school but never graduated. He enlisted in the Navy during World War II and after his discharge, shuttled between work in a garment center and as a janitor.

The world of theater opened for him when he got free tickets

to a production of the American Negro Theater. Curiosity led him backstage where he was recruited to help with the sets. He was hooked.

In 1955, Belafonte's first album, "Calypso," sparked the international calypso craze and was the first album in history to sell over a million copies.

His humanitarian efforts extend just as far.

He was a confidant and adviser to Martin Luther King Jr., and has served as chairman of the Martin Luther King Jr. Memorial Fund. In addition, he was the first member of the en-

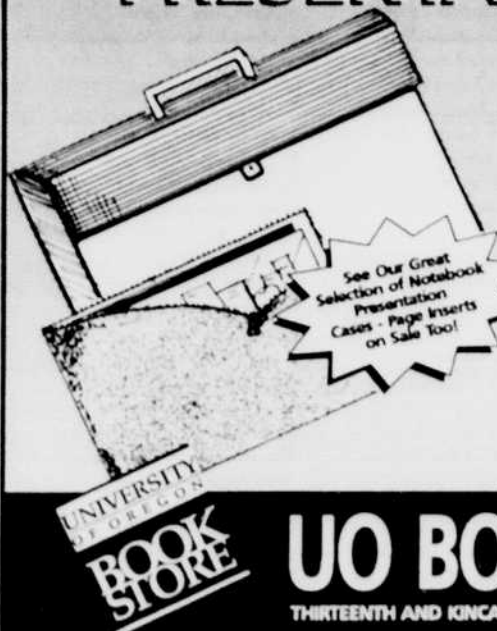
tertainment industry to be named by late President John F. Kennedy as a cultural adviser to the Peace Corps.

For his service, Belafonte has received numerous awards from such diverse groups as the American Jewish Congress, the NAACP and the Boy Scouts of America.

Among his more recent projects, Belafonte is producing a television mini-series for ABC-TV based on the lives of Nelson and Winnie Mandela.

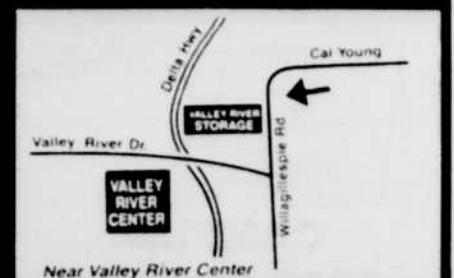
