Hearing focuses on proposed fee hikes

Round two of the hearings on proposed fee increases took place Tuesday afternoon, and it featured a more understanding audience than the first round on May 7

Both hearings were on amendments to the University's permanent administrative rule on special fees, fines, penalties and service charges. These amendments include fee increases in a variety of departments and services.

Cheryl Landauer, property specialist for the College of Human Development and Performance, said she supported increases in equipment fees.

because Landauer's department can no longer afford to take on the financial burden of cost increases themselves, she said.

Landauer said. "We must come out of the red. For the EMU Child Care Center, increasing

costs was a matter of preserving quality, said Dennis Reynolds, Child Care Coordinator.

'We decided to increase fees instead of dilute the quality of services." Reynolds said.

Students have had the chance to provide their input on the fee increases the child care facility is proposing, he said.

Of the 19 voting members of the EMU Child Care and Development Centers Parent Counsel. 13 are University students, Reynolds said.

Parents of children who receive care at the center also believe the increases are acceptable, he

said.
Parent users have had the opportunity to comment about the increases, and they think they're more than worth it for the services they receive."
