Bills take shots at gun purchases

State Rep. Vera Katz, D-Portland, introduced a bill in the Oregon House last week that would establish mandatory instant background checks before buying rifles and shotguns.

But Danna Schaeffer, chairwoman of Oregonians Against Gun Violence, said her organization would not support the proposal, instead calling for the passage of a different bill in the Legisla-

Katz's bill. HB 3576, would establish a system of instantaneous criminal and mental health background checks before rifle and shotguns could be sold by licensed firearms dealers

'We can no longer continue in our mistaken belief that violent criminals and the mentally ill don't buy guns from licensed gun dealers," Katz said. "The instant background check system will save lives that are being lost today because we lack even the most basic background checks on rifle and shotgun purchasers.

But Schaeffer, the mother of slain actress Rebecca Schaeffer, said HB 3576 doesn't go far

"I certainly share the sense of urgency to do something about unregulated gun sales." she said. "but an instant check offers only an inadequate background check for a very high cost.

I believe we can do better than this." Schaef fer said, calling for support of SB 633, which would extend to rifle purchases the current 15day waiting period for handguns. Unlike Katz's bill, the Senate bill would also regulate private rifle sales.

Leaders of two anti-field-burning groups have begun to campaign for an initiative ballot measure that would set stricter standards for field burning than provided by a bill currently in the

Bill Johnson of End Noxious Unhealthy Fumes and Sandra Thiele of Oregonians Against Field Burning presented an initiative to the Secretary of State that would phase out open grass seed field burning by 1997

A bill in the House, backed by members of the grass seed industry, would establish a more lenient time frame.

HB 3343 would maintain the current level of 165,000 acres of annual field burning until 1998. when that amount would then be reduced by

Petitioners must gather 89,000 signatures by July 1992 to get an initiative on the Nov. 1992

The Secretary of State's Office has received a proposed ballot initiative that would set term limits on state legislators and Oregon members in the U.S. Congress.

While several similar bills are in the state Legislature, the initiative is the first to begin looking for signatures to go on the ballot in the Nov. 1992

The petition would amend the Oregon Constitution to limit state legislators to a total of six years in the House, eight years in the Senate or a total of 12 years in either body.

Although state representatives serve two-year terms and senators are in office for four years. there is currently no limit on the number of terms

The petition would also limit Oregon members in the U.S. House to six years, and those in the U.S. Senate to 12 years
