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abled students at the state's colleges and universities next school year.

The Human Resources Committee will hear testimony on Senate Bill 974, which would establish physical access committees at higher education institutions and would require the State System of Higher Education to include disabled access in its next legislative budget request.

The Senate passed the bill earlier this month.

Oregon Disabilities Commission, Oregon Student Lobby and two disabled student organizations requested the bill, charging that the Higher Education System has been "too slow to respond to the needs of disabled students over the past several years."

Today's public hearing on SB 974 will be at 1 p.m. in Hearing Room D in the Capitol Building

in Salem.

State Sen. Bill Kenemer scolded the Senate last week after lawmakers refused a bill that would have replaced the legislators' health insurance with the kind of health care Oregon's poor will receive.

Kenemer said he proposed SB 1181 to allow state legislators to "directly experience" the kind of health care that the controversial health care rationing measure will provide the poor.

Kenemer pointed to what he called "the hypocrisy of creating a health care plan for the poor which the Senate refuses also to give itself."

The Senate voted last week to send Kenemer's bill back to committee, where it is expected to die.

"We have the opportunity to share in the same risks as we are asking the poor to bear," he said. "By sending this bill back to committee, the Senate is

shirking responsibility to share personally in health care for the poor."

The health care rationing plan is "good enough for the poor, but it's not good enough for us," Kenemer said. "I don't know how else one could interpret the Senate's action."

Attention geography majors: The first topographical mapping project of the entire state was completed last week, taking nearly a century to accomplish.

The U.S. Geological Survey began the project in 1893, publishing a one degree quad map of Ashland.

The series of maps, which show the shape and elevation of the landscape, was completed when a 7.5 minute series for Oregon was published.

Engineers, scientists, and even hikers and campers use topographical maps, which indicate a wide range of natural and man-made features.
