Three deans join University's ranks

nounced the hiring of two women and one current University professor to fill its three vacant dean chairs.

Risa Palm, currently associate vice chancellor for research and dean of the graduate school at the University of Colorado, Boulder, will join the University as Dean of the College of Arts and Sciences August 1.

The college of Arts and Sciences is the largest and the most diverse of the University's colleges. She succeeds Donald Van Houten, who is returning to classroom and research pur-

Anne Dhu Shapiro will become dean of the School of Music in July 1992. A keyboard artist who performs on harpsichord, fortepiano and piano, Shapiro is currently chair of the music department at Boston

"I am pleased to be coming to such a fine university in a glorious city and state," Shapiro said. "I hope to help the School of Music focus its considerable intellectual and musical resources to become the distinctive and important school it can be, while losing none of its warm collegiality.

Joining Palm and Shapiro will be Jerry Finrow, as Dean as the School of Architecture and Allied Arts. Finrow has been a professor of Architecture at the University for the last 20 years and will become dean July

Palm's 12 month salary will be \$89,500. Finrow and Shapiro, who will head smaller ad ministrative units, each will receive an annual 12-month salary of \$78,000.

Board limits smoking in EMU to Rec Center

By the time school starts fall term, EMU Recreation Center will be the last bastion for the building's smokers.

The EMU Board of Directors voted May 16 to ban smoking from the EMU Ballroom lobby and in the EMU Skylight, reducing the number of areas in the EMU from three to one.

The ban takes effect Sept. 21. Sue Pedersen, EMU Board member and Recreation Center manager, said three air filters will be installed in the ceiling of the Rec Center to improve air quality for non-smokers. The

total cost of the three air filters is \$3,900, Pedersen said.

At one point early in winter term, the board considered completely banning smoking in the EMU, but postponed a decision to get student input.

Although the board had decided to ban smoking in the other two areas, the debate hinged on the Rec Center.

She maintained that air circulation in the area was such that smoke would not be a problem for non-smokers.
