

Tuition for all students skyrockets

Beginning this term, the University will have the secondhighest tuition of any public university in the western United States.

In-state law students will pay \$5,018 this year, a 40.3 percent increase from last year's cost of \$3,576. Non-resident law students will pay \$9,446 for the 1991-92 year, a 67.8 percent increase from last year's cost of \$5,328.

In addition to raising tuition, the law school had to trim the 1991-92 first-year class to 125 students, down from 180 last year. Further enrollment cuts will follow until 1993-94, when the entire law enrollment will be stabilized at 360 students. This year, 440 law students are enrolled.

The law school cuts and tuition increases were made to decrease the student-to-faculty ratio and augment faculty salaries and student services. The American Bar Association had threatened to remove Oregon's law school from its list of accredited institutions unless these changes were made.

Undergraduate tuition for resident University students will cost \$2,598 a year, or \$167 more a term. In-state undergrad tuition at the University of California at Berkeley, the most expensive public school in the

West, costs only \$80 more a vear.

Because of Measure 5 cuts, the state system will still have to eliminate or merge 90 academic programs and trim enrollment by 2,000 students at its eight schools.

Casanova Center opens

After years of being hidden away in the tiny confines of McArthur Court and Gerlinger Hall, the entire athletic department has moved into the spacious Len Casanova Athletic Center next door to Autzen Stadium.

Although the \$11.7 million, 102,000-square foot building, named after the former Oregon football coach and athletic director, still has some work left to be completed, the entire athletic department moved in at the end of June, and an open house was held Aug. 21.

The new facility has already had its own brush with controversy. Athletic Director Bill Byrne ordered a set of sports sculptures at the front of the building cut down after he decided the sculptures did not fit in with the rest of the complex.

The action angered the sculptures' creator, Massachusetts artist George Greenamyer,
