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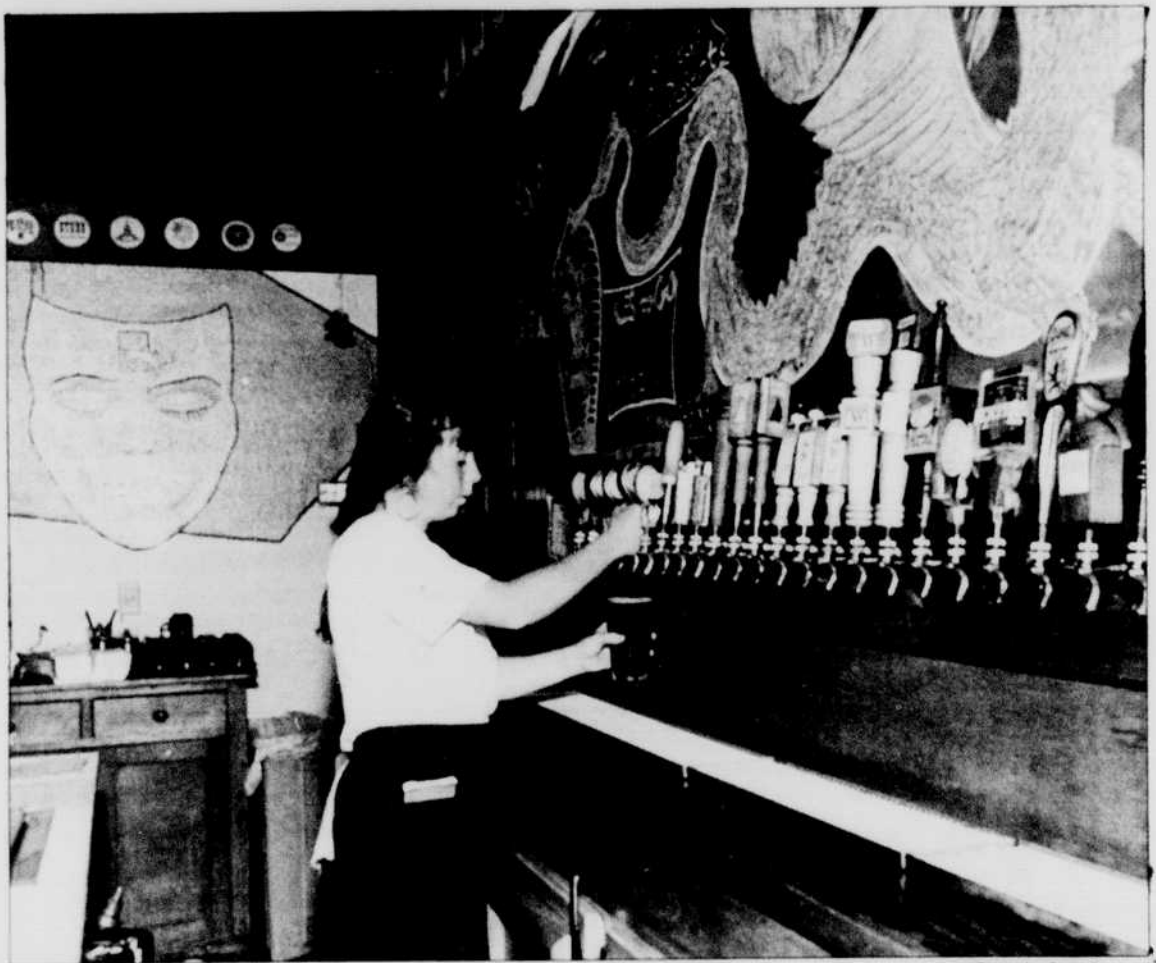

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## Nightlife offers a bit of everything

Hip-hop to jazz, bourbon to beer can be found in town

Eugene may not have all the glamour of big-city night life, but there are many clubs, taverns and bars in town that are special in their own Eugene kind of way.

Each of them offers something different for students 21 and over who want to get out to enjoy the weekend. What most of them have in common is that they cater to a mixed crowd. For the most part, none of them wants to pinpoint a certain segment of the population. Here is a sample of what's out there.

Steelhead Brewery, 199 E. 5th Ave., wins the honors of being the most impressive. They make their own root beer (it's the best), as well as beer and ale. A mahogany-finished bar and an old-fashioned telephone booth give it a classic flair, and the open-joint ceiling makes for a spacious environment.

Stone walls and large plants add earthiness, but the dark green plush furniture keeps things comfortable. The lighting is semi-dim.

"It's for people who don't feel comfortable in bars," said general manager Tom Sobieski.

At heart, Steelhead is a brewery that, like any other, offers daily tours of the brewing facilities.

Besides the obvious flow of beers and wines, Steelhead also has a food menu including pizza, sandwiches and soup, as well as beer-battered onion rings, brewery brownies and root beer floats.

Steelhead draws a mixed crowd. City people, working people, Springfield residents and students all find their way to the brewery on 5th Avenue. There is outdoor seating, and large windows inside look out at the 5th Street Market.

A CD sound system pipes in music, and several television sets broadcast sports. Steelhead is open from 11 a.m. to midnight on weekdays and 11 a.m. to 1 a.m. on weekends.
