Willamette AIDS Council education and outreach coordinator Doug DeWitt said the Acorn Club provides psychological care for members, which is just as important as medical care.

"There is a major bias to HIV and people who are HIV-positive," DeWitt said. "The Acorn Club is a safe place to be and talk and avoid all this awful stuff directed at people with

Lane County AIDS Hospice Services' agenda includes the creation of an Acorn House, Redfield said. The proposed specialized living facility will house five to 10 people who are in the advanced stages of AIDS and who are unable to care for themselves. Also welcome will be those who are homeless or whose family and friends can no longer adequately meet their care needs.

Acorn House will be staffed by health care professionals who will be trained to provide 24-hour care to meet all of the needs of people with AIDS. Redfield said Lane County

AIDS Hospice Services staff are now writing for grants from private, corporate and federal sources to fund the house.

Once a person is found to be HIV-positive, he or she can never get beyond the harsh reality of the disease, Robert said.

"It's constantly on your mind," Robert said. "Everything you do is colored by it and everything you say is colored by it. AIDS is awful. I've lived with knowing that someday I'm probably going to get sick with a terminal illness."

However, services like the Acorn Club have provided comfort to people who are HIVpositive, Robert said.

"AIDS is a very intense disease which brings about very intense emotions," he said. "A non-threatening place can be good, even a healing tool. The Acorn Club was a very nonthreatening thing for me to become involved with.


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
