Broekhoff is survived by his wife, Marna; and sons, Derik, Christopher and Alex.

His release finally came after repeated inquiries from the International Red Cross.

Medrano said he feels very fortunate to have been able to leave prison.


"It's nothing short of a miracle if (a) person walks out of prison alive," he said.
