nounced that an anonymous group of donors came forward to pay the cost of the relocation. The donors have given money to the athletic department in the past.

The University had originally planned to pay for the relocation costs with money from the auxiliary parking fund because the athletic department already has a deficit of \$1.7 million.

"Those funds were extra reserves that could be used for a variety of facility improvement needs," Remington said. "If you looked at all possible uses for the money, I don't think you could necessarily say this was the 'best' use.

"But the administration felt it was an appropriate use."

"The point is that the higher education system makes all these statements supporting gay rights but we haven't seen any concrete actions to back it up."

Drescher said she thinks the University should follow a plan that would give ROTC some sort of deadline when they will no longer be allowed on campus.

Lt. Col. James Hinton, head of the University's military science department, said his department has to follow the policies of the U.S. military.

"If the chancellor wants the policy changed, he is going about it the right way," he said.
