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tra period, San Jose State was awarded a rare penalty shot that Oregon goalie John O'Donnell stopped. The game ended a couple of minutes later when San Jose State found the net.

The Ducks won the only game of the trip Saturday night, but coach Sobol called it "one of the biggest victories in the history of the program."

Playing on an international rink and in front of about 300 rabid fans that Brown said "make the noise of about 1000," the Ducks never lost their composure.

Neither team scored in a very physical first two periods. Oregon defenseman Damian Jorgensen was hit and escorted to the bench for nine stitches on the chin in the second period but returned to score the game's first goal in the third.

The Golden Bears tied the score but saw their lead evaporate along with their hopes for a win when wing Richard Tucker swept in on goal and put the puck in the net for a big win.

"That's the toughest rink we have to play in this year," Brown said. "It's almost twice the size (of Lane County Ice) and with the wild crowd; it's a huge win."

The victory all but erased the memory of Friday night's brutal 8-0 blanking at the hands of non-league opponent Stanford. Despite sustaining injuries to Nevin Harper (shoulder) and Darin Varzali (ribs), Sobol was impressed with the Ducks, especially goalie John O'Donnell.

"I can't talk enough about

how well John played all weekend," Sobol said. "The Stanford game could have been much worse if he didn't stop all the shots he did. Overall I can think of only one word to describe the performance of these guys — courageous."

Brown was happy with the way the team responded to adversity. "A lot of guys stepped up into a leadership role this weekend," he said.

Oregon gets a well-deserved rest this weekend before hosting Colorado State for two games at Lane Ice November 16-17. "By far this is the finest team we'll play this year," Sobol said.

The Ducks are in second place, a game behind Hockey West leader San Jose State, with a record of 1-1 in league and 3-2 overall.
